## Rising Stars Summer Theater Program

The Rising Stars Summer Theater Program, sponsored by The Village Playbox Theater Company of Haddon Heights and the Borough of Haddon Heights, was held at the Haddon Heights Community Center from July 27 through August 8. Campers aged 7 to 12 met for three and a half hours each morning. On Saturday evening of the final week, campers put on an original production, written and directed by their camp counselors. Steve Allen, President of The Village Playbox and Director of the camp, said the program grew out of the success of the Acting for Beginners course, offered at the community center during the academic year. "Many parents of the kids in our class as well as patrons of our main stage productions expressed an interest in children's theater, particularly a summer show." This is the camp's second year of operation.

The Rising Stars Summer Theater slogan is "Where every child is a star!" The campers learned all aspects of the theater- from playwriting and auditioning to becoming a triple threat actor, dancer, and singer. Serving as counselors were Steve Allen of Berlin as Director/Producer and acting coach, Ariel Golan of Stratford as Director, Amanda Kochey of Williamstown as Choreographer, and Katie McBurnie as Music Director. The counselors took the campers through a morning of training and then production planning. This past summer their showcase was called "Breaking Character." An original play written by Golan, Kochey, and McBurnie, the show revolved around the members of a school drama club and their frustrations over always being typecasted. The camper's characters



sang and danced out their woes to a soundtrack of Broadway show tunes. "It's no easy task for adults to put on a community theater production in a typical eight week schedule, and these kids learned a whole show in only ten days!" explained McBurnie. "The talent was wonderful and the kids were a pleasure to work with," said Golan.

This year's program saw a significant jump in registrations. "We went from only eight campers last year to nineteen this year. That was incredible!" said Kochey. The counselors have great things in store for the future and are excited by the prospect of a longer running camp and a bigger production.

The Village Playbox produces three main stage shows each season and five children's interactive shows with its Storytime Theater program. ## From the Tax Office:

The Borough of Haddon Heights will hold their annual tax sale on Tuesday October 13, 2015 at 10am. The sale will take place in the auditorium at the Haddon Heights municipal building, located at 625 Station Avenue. The sale will be for any outstanding 2014 taxes, CCMUA sewer, or other municipal charge. Please check our website [www.haddonhts.com](http://www.haddonhts.com) or contact the tax office if you believe you are subject to the tax sale.

If you plan on bidding at the tax sale, please register with the tax collector by noon on Monday October 12, 2015.

## Overnight Parking Reminders:

- Parking is prohibited on Borough streets from midnight to 5:00am.
- Parking Permit applications are available at the Police Department located at 625 Station Avenue.
- 2015 permits must be displayed by 1/1/2015.
- The overnight parking number 856-784-9161. This number is also located on the Borough website several times in case you forget.
- Whenever there is a warning or prediction of possible snow or ice, ALL on-street parking is denied.



## Zoning and Code Enforcement

To all residents and homeowners in Haddon Heights:

There is an ongoing problem in the Borough with residents placing trash, recycling, brush, grass clippings, and leaves in the street in violation of borough codes 393-7 and 393-11. Also, any material generated by a contractor must be removed by the contractor.

Any material generated by a resident or homeowner not picked up by the normal trash collection, is the responsibility of the homeowner to remove within 3 days. All trash must

be in cans or tied bags when placed at the curb. No more than 5 cans and/or bags can be put out at a time.

When cleaning out a house due to moving, and the amount of trash exceeds 5 bags or cans, and must be put out earlier than the day before pickup, the homeowner is responsible to remove it or rent a dumpster. (Dumpsters placed in the street require a permit)

Violations of these codes may cause a summons to be issued and an appearance in Municipal Court required.

## Department of Public Works

### Leaf Pick-Up

Fall is just around the corner. As the leaves start changing that means they will soon start falling. Leaf collection will begin on October 15th and run until December 15th. During November and December the crews will be doing east side and west side every other week.

### Please adhere to the following guidelines:

- Lawn Service Contractors MUST remove leaves from your property.
- Rake your leaves to the CURB. Please DO NOT place leaves in the street. Leaf piles in the street cause flooding and drainage problems



during rainstorms.

- Please DO NOT place leaves closer than 10 feet from any storm sewer inlet.
- Please DO NOT mix leaves and brush. Your can(s) will NOT be collected if it is mixed. When the trucks are taken to be dumped the dump can and will refuse our trucks if there is anything mixed in that is not allowed to be. We thank you in advance for your cooperation.



## Revolutionary War Encampment

**THE BRITISH ARE COMING! THE BRITISH ARE COMING!**  
Saturday, October 10th - 10 am to 4 pm (rain or shine)



The Borough will host re-enactors from the Second Pennsylvania Regiment of the Continental Army in Camden County Park on North Park Drive at Green Street, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., rain or shine. Families are invited to picnic along with the Encampment. Soldiers will set up camp on North Park Drive. Skirmishes and "firing demonstrations" of cannons and muskets will take place at 11:30 a.m., 1:30 and 3 p.m.

Haddon Heights is a registered town in the Crossroads of the American Revolution, a National Heritage Area between Philadelphia and New York. Four Revolutionary War houses can be found in Haddon Heights, said Rose Fitzgerald, Event Organizer. "The Revolutionary War was a conflict of few great battles but many skirmishes. Troops fought in this corridor to protect or sabotage movement between these cities. Local militia harassed the British by destroying bridges, including the corduroy bridge over King's Highway, cutting down trees to block roads and firing into the lines. The British in turn ransacked homes and businesses, including the Glover House and Glover Fulling Mill which had been recently built. The British stole food and

livestock and ravished Patriot women. John Hinchman III sided with the British after the Declaration of Independence, reading a protest at the Gloucester County Courthouse. He was literally 'run out of town'; and his property near the Barrington Circle seized."

Three patriots' houses remain in Heights: Colonel Joseph Ellis House on Sycamore, John Glover House on Sylvan and Chalkley Glover House on New Jersey Avenue. Historical markers describing the history of these houses have been placed, with the owners' permission, by the Historical Society. A brochure is available at the Library.

Glover joined the Patriot cause and was "read out" of his Quaker Meeting for his active role. Re-enactors of the 2nd Pennsylvania portray typical troops on both sides. The 2nd Pennsylvania is noted for its valiant service with Gen. Anthony Wayne. During this living history event soldiers will set up camp and campfires, service equipment, prepare food, conduct drills and speak with local compatriots. Patriot women will prepare and cook meals. Cannons and muskets will be fired.

Speaking of school, we are proud to announce that we have two probationary firefighters that will be pursuing Firefighter I training at the Camden County Fire Academy. Preston Antrilli and DJ Alexander who have both served with us in the department's Explorer Program will be going through extensive academy training along with the additional training provided weekly from the HHFD. We welcome them aboard, and look forward to many years of service from them.

Fall also means cooler temperatures and warming up by a fire. We want you to stay warm, but to also stay safe. The rules and regulations vary from town to town, but the burning of vegetation, rubbish, or any other residential trash is prohibited. The use of chimney pots and outdoor furnaces should be done at least 15-25 feet away from any structure, preferably in an enclosed or covered container, using only firewood as fuel. You should also have an ABC extinguisher or hose nearby. Make sure that the fire is not too large to control, and be considerate of your surroundings and neighbors. If the smoke becomes a nuisance it may result in a visit from the fire department. We're always happy to assist you, and if you have any questions, don't hesitate to call our fire prevention office during normal business hours.

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## Storm Water Pollution



Storm water pollution is one of New Jersey's biggest threats to clean and plentiful water. With everyone's help we can share the responsibility by making small, easy changes in our everyday lives. There are many common pollutants that we can help keep out of the storm water. This all adds up to cleaner water and it also saves on the high cost of cleaning up once the water is dirty.

Storm water is water that is generated when precipitation from rain and snow melt. It flows over land or impervious surfaces such as paved roads and parking lots and does not seep into the ground. This run off transports pollutants such as trash, grass, and other things which gather on these surfaces. The water and debris make their way to inlets and then flooding will occur.

As a resident, business, or other member of the Haddon Heights community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

- Properly use and dispose of any hazardous products (there are hazardous waste

recycling days that are normally set up each year, please contact the Public Works Department for a list of those days 856-546-2580)

- Keep pollution out of storm drains (do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a storm water system)
- Clean up after your pet. (Pet waste pollutes our waters when left on the ground, animal waste contains high concentration of nutrients as well as bacteria and disease-causing microorganisms that can cause problems)
- Don't litter
- Dispose of yard waste properly
- Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides



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## Haddon Heights Environmental Commission



### Haddon Heights Recreation - Open Spaces - Natural Resources Map

The Haddon Heights Environmental Commission (HHEC) has solicited and received bids for the design and creation of a Haddon Heights Recreation - Open Spaces - Natural Resources Map. The design will be funded from a grant awarded to the HHEC by the Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions (ANJEC), and the printing cost will be funded by Sustainable Haddon Heights 501(c)(3). This map will show the locations of our open spaces (parks and public gardens), recreational facilities, natural resources, and landmarks throughout the town. Although not to scale, the format and layout will be viewer-friendly and use a grid reference for easier locating of many of our points of interest. Our goal is to provide the residents of Haddon Heights and visitors to our town with a fun reference to the treasures we have to offer. HHEC plans to have the map available in printed and electronic form, through the Haddon Heights Borough web site (<http://haddonhts.com/>), Library, Elementary Schools and the Sustainable Haddon Heights website ([www.sustainablehaddonheights.org](http://www.sustainablehaddonheights.org)) sometime during the October time frame.

### Sustainable Haddon Heights - Efficiency Assessment

With help from the Sustainable Haddon Heights committee, Haddon Heights was the first township to have a lighting and HVAC assessment through the new PSE&G Direct Install Program. In this program, PSE&G offers municipalities and non-profits the opportunity to take part in a free lighting and HVAC assessment. After the assessment PSE&G will then help provide high efficiency upgrades and installation for a fraction of the cost. These assessments have already taken place at the Borough Hall, Fire Department, Haddon Heights Library, Service Operations Facility, Community Center and the Log Cabin. We hope we can inform you about the future projects and energy savings soon.

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*New Jersey's Anti-Idling Law allows us all to breathe a little easier!*

Things you need to know include:

- 1) Leaving a motor vehicle running releases a large amount of pollution into the atmosphere, as well as poisoning our plants and animals;
- 2) Every gallon of gas used produces about 19 pounds of carbon dioxide;
- 3) Diesel exhaust contains a likely cancer-causing particle known as soot, and worsens asthma, bronchitis, existing allergies and may contribute to decreased lung function, lung cancer and heart

disease;

- 4) School Bus drivers in New Jersey have pledged to not idle their vehicles more than three minutes – for the benefit of our children's health! If you transport your children to school, it is requested is that you also pledge to not idle. You can also consider alternatives like walking, biking or car-pooling to reduce our cumulative carbon emissions.



Included will be Children Song of Haddonfield, various instrumentalists including students from The Curtis Institute of Music and others.



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# Sustainable Haddon Heights



Sustainable Haddon Heights invites you to visit them every Sunday from 9:30 am until 1pm at their booth “Sundays on Station with Sustainable Haddon Heights” located adjacent to the Haddon Heights Farmers’ Market. There are only four more weeks until the end of farmers’ market season. Each week, the group will be having demonstrations on various aspects of sustainability and gardening. Currently, the “Stop Using Plastic Bags” project is underway. Stop by the table after you make your purchases at the market. For each reusable bag you have used, receive an entry into the weekly contest and win a reusable produce bag. Due to demand for the bag, they now have them for a donation of \$3, less than cost, for anyone who wants them. Many people take the traditional reusable bag to the grocery store but then take many of the small plastic bags in the produce department. They are the least reused bags! These reusable produce bags take the place of the small plastic bags. Forgot your reusable bag, stop by the booth and get a free one to use shopping. It is yours to keep or you can return at a later date.

When you stop and chat about the topic of the day, you receive an entry for our monthly prize. The prize for October is a composter! This season, there have been winners of \$25 gift certificates as well as a rain barrel.

The tentative schedule is as follows:

October 4: Backyard Chickens—Learn about pets that provide breakfast as well as excellent fertilizer and insect control in your yard. There may be a visiting hen.

October 18: Fall yard clean-up—Save time and energy by leaving some plants in the garden over the winter while providing wildlife with food and shelter.

October 11: Leaf It Alone—Instead of putting your leaves out to be collected, find out about using them for free mulch and fertilizer for your lawn.

October 25: Food Day—Join citizens all over the U.S. in celebrating food day. Take the pumpkin challenge. Bring an item for the food pantry. Prevent food waste.

## Be on the Lookout for the Plastic Bag Monster!

Have you seen the Plastic Bag Monster? It has been seen roaming the streets of Haddon Heights recently. Perhaps one even lives at your house. It takes about 500 plastic bags to spawn a Plastic Bag Monster. That’s about what the average person takes home in a year.



Unfortunately, only about 10% of plastic bags are recycled. The rest end up in the landfill, where they will remain forever, or littering the landscape and ocean. Plastic does not biodegrade but photodegrades, meaning that it breaks down into smaller and smaller pieces when exposed to sunlight, but never goes away. Just like diamonds, plastic bags are forever.

Many plastic bags will end up in the Great Pacific Garbage Patch, a floating collection of plastic and trash, 80% of which came from land. Its size is estimated to be somewhere between twice the area of Texas to the size of the continental U. S. In some parts of the ocean, the concentrations of plastic is 40 times greater than that of plankton. Marine animals consume the plastic along with the plankton, causing many to die while others become entangled in it.

Some of the plastic bags will remain in the landscape, caught in trees or littering the streets, with taxpayers footing the bill to have them removed. Others will be improperly recycled in single-stream collections, where they will become ensnared in the processing equipment, requiring costly manual removal.

Here’s some things you can do to reduce the population of Bag Monsters and the problems they cause:

1. Get in the habit of taking reusable bags with you when you shop.
2. Don’t use plastic produce bags. Sustainable Haddon Heights is offering reusable produce bags at a subsidized cost of \$3 each. You can pick them up at our table on Station Avenue on Sunday mornings between 9:30 AM and 1 PM or at our booth at the Fall Festival, Saturday, October 3.
3. 4% of landfill is dog poop in plastic bags and it will be there for generations to come. The EPA recommends flushing pet waste. Use flushable doggie poop bags when you clean up after your pet. They are designed to dissolve in water. Flushable cat litter is also available.

4. Be sure to properly recycle any plastic bags you do use. Place them in the collection containers at most grocery stores. Do not put them in with your single-stream recyclables.

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## Ways to Reduce Food Waste and Save Money

The USDA estimates approximately 20% of the food consumers purchase goes uneaten. Reducing this waste will enable you to spend less on food. Here's some tips that Sustainable Haddon Heights has gathered that you might find helpful in reducing your food waste.

Make sure your refrigerator temperature is between 34 and 40 degrees. Freezers should be set to zero. While cold temperatures can't destroy the microorganisms that cause food to spoil, it slows down food spoilage.

If you find that you frequently forget about items in your refrigerator or freezer, organize them so they are more visible. Perhaps something as simple as a lazy Susan will prevent items from disappearing in the back of the refrigerator.

Properly store the groceries you purchase so they will last longer. As a general rule, do not wash produce until ready to use. Do not store meat and produce together. Here's some tips for storing specific items.

- Bananas: Wrap the crown in plastic and store on countertop away from sunlight.
- Bread: Freeze what will not be consumed in a day. Do not store in refrigerator.
- Berries (blackberries, blueberries, raspberries, strawberries): Place in solution of one part vinegar to three parts water, drain, rinse, spin gently in salad spinner lined with several layers of paper towels, store in paper towel-lined container in refrigerator.
- Broccoli: Wrap in foil or place stalks in water and store in refrigerator.
- Celery: Wrap in foil and store in refrigerator.

- Eggs: Store in the refrigerator, but not on the door. To determine whether an egg is fresh, immerse it in a pan of cool, salted water. If it sinks, it is fresh, but if it rises to the surface, throw it away.
- Lettuce: Wrap in foil and store in refrigerator.
- Milk: Store on the middle shelf of the refrigerator and not on the door.
- Mushrooms: Keep in original container or in a brown paper bag if purchased loose.
- Potatoes: Store in a cardboard box, paper or mesh bag, away from onions, in a dark place. Potatoes store best at between 45 and 50 degrees. Do not store in refrigerator. A wine refrigerator is OK, but some feel it affects the taste of the wine.
- Tomatoes: Place on countertop away from sunlight with stem end down or cover the stem end with tape and store with the stem end up.

Don't store items that are bruised, overripe, or about to spoil as they will cause other items to spoil more quickly. Use them as soon as possible.

Consider purchasing an ethylene gas absorber to delay the ripening of much of your produce. They cost about \$15. Bluapple and ExtraLife are two such products and are available online and at houseware stores. (This is not an endorsement of these products but provided to assist you in finding this type of item.)

Purchase locally grown produce when possible. Travel time reduces shelf life. Find new uses for excess food. Use leftover mashed potatoes as a base for potato pancakes. Use a food processor to turn stale bread into bread crumbs. Use sour milk in place of buttermilk

for pancakes or cornbread.

For storage, use Mason jars instead of plastic containers. They don't stain and cut produce will last longer. Additionally, you won't have to worry about being exposed to the BPA that can be found in some plastic containers. Food is also more visible.

Understand the USDA dates on products.

- A "Sell-By" date tells the store how long to display the product for sale. You should buy the product before the date expires.
- A "Best if Used By (or Before)" date is recommended for best flavor or quality. It is not a purchase or safety date.
- A "Use-By" date is the last date recommended for the use of the

product while at peak quality. The date has been determined by the manufacturer of the product. It does not mean that the product cannot be used after that date. However, remember the old adage, "If in doubt, throw it out".

Track what is being thrown out. It will make you mindful of what you are discarding. Perhaps you should purchase less of these items.

Plan meals and purchase accordingly. While this may take a little upfront time, you won't have to think about what to have for dinner and whether or not you have the necessary ingredients.

Rather than throwing spoiled food in the trash, where it will remain for generations in the landfill, consider backyard or worm composting for spoiled produce.

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## Putting your Garden to Bed

Years ago I knew a woman named Mazie. She said she loved her children most twice a day: first thing in the morning when they just woke and last thing at night as she tucked them to bed.

The garden is like this. I love it first thing in the morning, the dew sparkling on the leaves, the plants fully hydrated from the moisture of overnight. The garden is then, alive with sounds: birds taking deep swoops among the branches, squirrels playing chase along the fence tops. Bees “come-to” from their nectar-filled doze. I am very much in love with the garden in spring, the “let’s-have-at-it” time of year when we are raring to go, boots in the starting blocks after a long winter’s rest. We can’t wait to get outside in the warm sunshine and earth-scented air.

In the evening, my favorite time in the garden, the light cast is more a gentle glow. I can sit and look out over my small, green, quarter acre dominion, assessing my accomplishments of the

day, whether that was cleaning up or installing container gardens. Rob will have shaken a frosty martini for me on a weekend night and the two of us can enjoy each other’s company surrounded by the scent and colors. Then there is autumn, next only to spring in the volume of work. But the temperatures are more accommodating for outdoor work, the process of “tucking-in” more gentle and less frenzied a pace. The squirrels don’t have time for play right now; they are positioning acorns in the lawn in a chess board pattern while a few birch leaves skip across the turf. And compared to spring, even more fleeting. The deep gold of my neighbor’s linden trees, so rich and wonderful, I stop my writing every few minutes to enjoy them. By next week, the leaves will certainly be gone. Another neighbor has a majestic ginkgo tree that displays its very best self in a brilliant yellow for maybe a day or two. It is just about peak right now. Try to enjoy these brief visual harvests while you can.

Some folks don’t do much in the way of fall garden clean-up; instead, they wait until spring. Here is a list of why I don’t recommend that stance and some of my best practices:

1. Work load. I might have just put off until spring several years back, like when I was 20, but I have learned the garden art of “pacing.” Unless I want to spend the time and money with the chiropractor and take Advil chasers after every meal, I have found I enjoy the garden much more when it doesn’t seem like a fire drill of activity. The way I look at it now is any effort made now is money in the work bank toward next year;
2. I tend not to remember how big some things have grown by the time spring comes. Autumn can be a good time to see what might need to be transplanted or divided. Even if I don’t actually do this now, I can write it down for the spring to-do list;
3. Gets you starting off on the right foot in the spring without having to first clean stuff. Such as these two main things:

**Garden Pottery:** empty, clean and store your garden pottery to avoid losing it against freeze/thaw conditions. Unless they are frost-proof in which case plant it up again!

**Garden Tools:** After your final garden day for the season, clean and sharpen all of your tools. Make a list of anything that needs replacing so you will have it ready come spring. You might even find things on the sale rack at the garden center. In which case, stock up now and save some cash;



4. And most importantly, as we appreciate the season of harvest and color, it reminds us why we engage in this garden thing anyway; it is about love. Love for the people with whom we consider special and important enough to share our gardens--not only the space to be in, but what we grow as extensions of that love, whether it be food harvested and meals shared, beautiful flowers, shade cast from a tree under which we sit; love for the whole world that we see illustrated in even the smallest piece of the garden understanding it is part of the whole; and last, that we know we are making healthy choices for ourselves and our community large and small by our actions, always growing.

Then find a favorite place to put your feet up and toast the season.
