MAYOR'S MESSAGE:

Dear Residents:

It was great to see so many of you enjoying our Fourth of July celebration this year. The weather finally let up after what seemed like weeks of rain and we had one of the most successful parades that anyone can remember. Plus, our celebration afterward at Hoff's Park really showcased the efforts of the many volunteers that helped put it together. I want to thank everyone who volunteered to make the parade and celebration the terrific success that it was.

Speaking of events, we had another wonderful Neighbors Night Out in early June that was very well attended. This was another great opportunity to show off the spirit of community we have here in Heights. I again want to thank all of

the volunteers who worked so hard to make this event the success that it was. Our summer recreation program is having another great year, with many outdoor activities, crafts, games, and sports for our kids. This program not only provides great opportunities for our kids but is also a job opportunity for many of our high school students! As always, Council President Kathy Lange has gone above and beyond the call of duty to make sure that this program stays top-notch.

In terms of other happenings in town, we continue to work to get the Glover Mill project running. The builder, Bob Meyer, has been working hard to navigate the layers of approval needed from both the County and the State before



he can begin construction. Your Mayor and Council as well as others behind the scenes have worked together with the developer to facilitate bringing this project to fruition. And, most importantly, the project will result in the construction of the one-acre Glover Mill Park, an area that will showcase the historic aspects of the site and preserve that acre as open space.

Finally, for those of you who that are homeown-

ers you will be receiving your tax bills shortly. With your bills is a letter explaining the details of the municipal tax rate, which I urge you to review carefully. Briefly, however, it was necessary to pass along a modest increase in the municipal portion of your tax rate. The municipal portion of your tax rate is still the smallest portion of the total taxes that you pay at only approximately 21%. The rest goes to the school district and to Camden County. But, any increase is not something that we take lightly. The reasons for the increase are higher health insurance costs (which we do not control); a small downturn in the number of taxpayers who pay their taxes on time; and a tax cut several years ago under prior leadership that did not plan enough for future needs. In order to continue to provide you with the same or better

levels of service that you deserve as a Heights resident, it was necessary for us to pass along this increase. We will continue to work as hard as we can to ensure that any future increases are as small as possible, while still maintaining and investing in our town.

HADDON HEIGHTS ELECTRONIC WASTE RECYCLING PROGRAM BEGINNING

AUGUST 1, 2013

On January 1, 2011 the "ELECTRONIC WASTE MANAGEMENT ACT" took effect. With passage of this new law, residents are now required to recycle televisions, laptop & personal computers, and computer monitors known as e-waste. Electronic devices covered under this law are to be disposed of at an approved electronic recycling facility. This is crucial because recycling your electronic devices keeps dangerous materials such as lead, mercury, cadmium, and chromium from being released into the environment. Your Governing Body decided to take a proactive approach by offering an efficient collection site to recycle your e-waste. Beginning August 1, 2013 you can now drop off your e-waste Monday thru Friday from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Haddon Heights Department of Public Works at 514 West Atlantic Ave. The following are accepted electronic recycling items:

FROM THE TAX OFFICE -

The homestead benefit credit, for those who qualified will be reflected in your third quarter bill. The credits are the same as last year.

The deadline for filing your 2012 NJ Property Tax Reimbursement (a/k/a 'Senior Freeze') has been extended to September 19, 2013.

The basic qualifications are:

- You must have been age 65 or older as of 12/31/11
- Lived in NJ continuously since 12/31/01
- Paid your taxes for 2011 and 2012 in full by 6/1 of 2011 and 2012.
- Total annual income for 2011 \$80,000 or less/ for 2012 \$82,880 or less (counting social security)

Call the Tax Office 547-7164, ext 30 if you have not applied previously and think you may meet the above qualifications.

The following items were addressed at the May 21st Council Meeting:

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Public Hearing and final adoption of Ordinance 2013:1394 An Ordinance Amending Chapter 183 of the Code of the Borough of Haddon Heights Entitled Curfew. Seeing no one come forward, a motion to close the public hearing was made by Councilwoman Griffith and seconded by Council President Lange.

Motion to adopt Ordinance 2013:94 was made by Councilwoman Griffith and seconded by Councilman Merryfield. All members voted in favor.

NEW BUSINESS:

Resolution 2013:87 – Resolution Authorizing Payment of Bills & Claims for 2nd Half of May. Payment to Barlow Chevrolet was pulled from the bill list in the Caucus portion of the meeting. A motion to adopt Resolution 2013:87 as amended was made by Councilwoman Griffith and seconded by Council President Lange. Under roll call vote, all members voted in favor. Councilman DiRenzo wanted to note his opposition to the payment to Art Sign.

Resolution 2013:88 - Resolution Providing for a Meeting Not Open to the Public in Accordance With the Provisions of the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Act, N.J.S.A. 10:4-12.1. A motion was made to adopt Resolution 2013:88 was made by Councilwoman Griffith and seconded by Council President Lange. All members voted in favor.

Resolution 2013:89 – Resolution Supporting Haddon Heights Shade Tree Commission's Community Stewardship Incentive Program Grant Application. A motion to adopt 2013:89 was made by Councilwoman Griffith and seconded by Councilman Merryfield. All members voted in favor.

Resolution 2013:90 – Resolution Approving a Raffle License for St. Rose of Lima Parish. A motion to adopt Resolution 2013:90 was made by Councilwoman Griffith and seconded by Councilman Berryhill. All members voted in favor.

Resolution 2013:91 Resolution stating that 2013 Municipal Budget may be read by Title Only. Motion to adopt was made by Councilman Merryfield, seconded by Councilwoman Griffith. All members present voted yes with the exception of Councilman DiRenzo who voted no.

The following items were addressed at the June 5th Council Meeting:

Resolution 2013:75 - Public Hearing and final adoption of the 2013 Municipal Budget. Mayor Forte opened the meeting to the public for their comments or concerns regarding the 2013 Municipal Budget. Hearing or see no comments from the public, motion to close the public hearing on the 2013 Municipal Budget was made by Councilwoman Griffith, seconded by Councilman DiRenzo.

Resolution 2013:102 – Resolution to Amend the 2013

Municipal Budget. Motion to adopt Resolution 2013:102 was made by Councilman Merryfield, seconded by Councilwoman Griffith. Upon a roll call vote all members of council voted yes.

Motion to adopt Resolution 2013:75, 2013 Municipal Budget as amended, was made by Councilman Berryhill, seconded by Councilwoman Griffith.

Under discussion, various council members expressed their feelings about the budget. Councilwoman Lange said she has met with Fire Chief Nick Scardino and Department Heads. Councilman DiRenzo said he felt that there was not enough time to review the budget. Councilman Berryhill said he does not see “any long-term planning. He noted that there was some discussion on shared services study for the police department. He also noted 9.5% increase this year, stating that revenues are going down, and then said he was going to vote against this. Berryhill then stated that we are paying interest and principal on Project Garnet and noted that next year he wants to see some long term planning. Berryhill also said he would like to see both parties be involved in the budget process. Councilman DiRenzo said the budget needs tightening up and is concerned about bonding. Council President Lange stated that on March 19th she asked for a public work session and not one council member was in favor. She also said that she also found that Department Heads have been conservative. Lange said that rental revenues were up \$13,261 from 2011 to 2012 indicating that there has been a significant increase in rental revenues.

With no further comment from council members, Mayor Forte called for a roll call vote. Councilmen Berryhill and DiRenzo voted no, Councilman Merryfield and Councilwoman Griffith, Fitzgerald and Council President Lange voted yes. Budget passed.

Resolution 2013:92 – Resolution Authorizing Refund of Tax Overpayment. Motion to adopt Resolution 2013:92 was made by Councilman Berryhill, seconded by Councilman Merryfield. Under a roll call vote all members voted yes.

Resolution 2013:93 – Resolution Authorizing Payment of Bills & Claims for 1st Half of June As Amended. Motion to adopt Resolution 2013:93 as amended was made by Councilwoman Griffith, seconded by Council President Lange. Under a roll call vote all members voted yes.

Resolution 2013:94 – Resolution Authorizing Borough Tax Collector to Prepare Estimated Tax Bills in Accordance with N.J.S.A. 54:4-66.3.

Motion to table Resolution 2013:94 was made by Councilwoman Griffith, seconded by Councilman Merryfield. All members were in favor.

Resolution 2013:95 – Resolution Requesting Approval of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services to Establish a Dedicated Trust by Rider for Community Garden Expenses. Motion to adopt Resolution 2013:95 was made by Councilman Berryhill, seconded by Council President Lange. Under a roll call vote, all members present voted yes.

Resolution 2013:96 – Resolution Approving Certified List of Fire Department Volunteers Eligible for Length of Service Awards Program (LOSAP) for the Year 2012. Motion to adopt was made by Councilwoman Griffith, seconded by Councilman Berryhill. Under a roll call vote, all members present voted yes.

Resolution 2013:97 – Resolution Authorizing the Award of a Non-Fair and Open Contract for 2013 Extended Cab Chevrolet Pick-up Truck for the Department of Public Works. Motion to adopt Resolution 2013:97 was made

by Councilwoman Griffith, seconded by Councilwoman Fitzgerald. Upon a roll call vote, all members present voted yes.

Resolution 2013:98 – Resolution Authorizing Refund of Street Opening Permit Fees to New Jersey American Water Company. Motion to adopt Resolution 2013:98 was made by Councilwoman Griffith, seconded by Councilman Berryhill. Under a roll call vote, all members present voted yes.





- Softball players Maddie McCleery (Barrington), Shayla Sweeney (Barrington), Taylor Nichols (Barrington) and Chelsea Thomas (Barrington) all got their 100th career hit this season.
- Lawnside resident, Alex Thompson, won the New Jersey state heavyweight wrestling championship in Atlantic City and finished the season with a 38 and 0 record.
- Wrestlers Phil Azzari of Barrington was a District and Regional Champion. Dan Hovern and Ian Lynch of Haddon Heights were District wrestling champs.
- Lawnside resident, Dominique Irons, broke the New Jersey state record in the triple jump with a jump of over 50 feet 6 inches. This was the fourth longest jump in the nation this year. Dom also broke a school record in the triple jump relay with freshman Nick Smith of Barrington. Dom is the New Jersey Meet of Champions winner in the triple jump as well. Dom was voted "Performer of the Year" by the South Jersey Coaches Association.
- Jon Weaver, soccer goalie, of Barrington, broke the school record for most shutouts in a season with 15 and career shutouts with 41. Jon was also The Inquirer's South Jersey player of the year for the soccer season.
- Pam Watson, of Haddon Heights, broke the school record in girls' javelin. Matt Moore of Haddon Heights, broke the school record in boys' javelin.
- Brandon Joyner, of Lawnside, became only the ninth boys' basketball player to score 1000 points in his high school career.
- Nick Sciortino of Barrington had his 100th career hit on the boys' baseball team.
- Four graduating seniors received NCAA Division I athletic scholarships. Softball pitcher, Shayla Sweeney (Barrington) to Rutgers; wrestler Alex Thompson to the University of Delaware; baseball player Nick Sciortino to Boston College and track member, Dom Irons to North Carolina A and T.
- Varsity teams had seven wins over Haddonfield throughout the year.
- At Music in the Parks at Dorney Park, the Men's Chorus received an Excellent Rating with a with a first place finish, the Junior School Chorus received a Superior Rating with a second place; the Women's Choir received a Superior Rating with a first place and also received the Overall Choir Award. Lindsay Narducci of Barrington was named Best Soloist, Justina Snyder of Haddon Heights received the Accompanist Award.
- Two graduating seniors, Phillip Azzari of Barrington and James Hicks of Haddon Heights, received Congressional nominations to military academies. Subsequently, Phil will attend the Coast Guard Academy, James will attend the Merchant Marine Academy.

99.5% of this year's graduating class will continue their education at 4 year colleges, 2 year colleges, career education programs, in the military and in apprentice programs.

Overall, the class of 2013 has been extremely successful academically. In the fall, 58% of the class of 2013 will be attending four year colleges; 36%, two year colleges; 2%, trade schools; and 4% will be entering the work force or the armed services.

Some of the colleges our graduates will be attending in the fall are: Boston College, Camden County College, Drexel University, George Mason University, James Madison University, Rider University, Rowan University, Rutgers University, Temple University, Towson University, University of Delaware, West Chester University, and Widener University.

Athletically, the senior class had an amazing year. We had 32 seniors who were First Team All Conference All Stars and 9 Seniors who were Second Team All Conference All Stars.

The senior class had a huge part in the Girls' Field Hockey team making it to the South Jersey Championship Game. They also had a big part in the Girls' Soccer team winning the South Jersey Championship. The seniors played a major role in the Boys' Tennis team winning the South Jersey Championship. They were also a huge factor in the Boys' Soccer team and Girls' Softball team winning the South Jer-

sey Championship and State Championship! The seniors also led the football team to victory in the Mayor's Cup on Thanksgiving Day. The Wrestling team had two seniors win the District Championship and Regional Championship and one of those seniors also became the first state champion in school history! The track team had two seniors (one male and one female) break the school record in the Javelin, another senior broke the school record in the 200 meter and the state record in the triple jump with a jump of 50 ft. 6¾ in. which is the longest jump in the history of New Jersey High Schools. This same senior is the State Champion in the 100 meter dash and the triple jump and the Meet of Champion winner in the triple jump.

The High School Women's Choir received a Superior Rating, a First Place, and Overall trophy at the Music In the Parks competition. The marching unit won the USBands New Jersey State Championship, the marching unit color guard and percussion both won the USBands National Championship title. The High Voltage Color Guard won the USBands Indoor Color Guard Championship.




