## Revolutionary War Encampment, Saturday, October 12th

Rain or Shine! The Borough of Haddon Heights will celebrate its Revolutionary War history and host re-enactors from the Second Pennsylvania Regiment of the Continental Army in Camden County Park on North Park Drive, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., rain or shine. Families are invited to picnic along with the Encampment. Soldiers will set up camp across from the Hinchman-Hurley House at 1019 North Park Drive. Skirmishes and "firing demonstrations" of cannons and muskets will take place at 11:30 a.m., 1:30 and 3 p.m.

"This war was fought on our own soil," stated Rose Fitzgerald, Councilwoman and Event Chair. Haddon Heights is a registered town in the Crossroads of the American Revolution, a National Heritage Area between Philadelphia and New York. The Revolutionary War was a conflict of a few great battles but many skirmishes. Troops fought in this corridor to protect or sabotage movement between these cities.

Dear Neighbors:

I'm happy to report that Haddon Heights continues to receive great publicity and recognition for the special town that it is. The September 2013 issue of New Jersey Monthly, which ranked 514 towns in our state, ranked Haddon Heights as the top town in Camden County. The rankings noted our relatively low average property tax change since 2010 and the significant increase we have seen in property values since 2010. Of course, the news of this great ranking comes on the heels of us having been recognized earlier this year by Philadelphia Magazine as one of the top 10 Hottest Philadelphia Suburbs. Myself and your Borough Council will keep working to keep our quality of life as high as it can possibly be – and we do this for you, not for the recognition or publicity. It is great to see that the hard work of everyone in our town is being recognized beyond our borders!

You may have recently seen that our Planning Board granted final approval to the Glover Mill Village project. This development, which will be built by Bob Meyer Communities, will respect our town's historic character while bringing important new tax ratables on board. It took some time over the last year and a half to get this project on track for final approval. I want to thank the members of Council, the Borough Engineer, the Borough Solicitor, and our Planning Board. All of these people spent countless hours on making sure that this exciting new project is ready to go. Importantly, over one acre of the site will be preserved as parkland, which will open up the area of the Glover Fulling Mill ruins to the public so that everyone can see and appreciate this intriguing historic asset that sits right in our town. I urge anyone who has any questions about what the development will



look like to stop by Borough Hall where we have on display large posterboard images of the styles of homes that Bob Meyer Communities presented to our Planning Board and public during the recent hearings on final approval.

With the summer ending, two of our most popular events are coming up. On Saturday, October 5, we will have our annual Fall Festival and Corvette Show. This is a great opportunity to visit our Station Avenue businesses, explore the offerings that the many different vendors and civic groups will have at their spots on the

Avenue, and socialize with your neighbors. On October 12, we will have our annual Revolutionary War Encampment. I hope to see many of you at both of these events!

With fall now here and the fewer hours of daylight, I urge you to be cautious as you travel through town. With our kids back at school and our fall sports in full swing, we all need to be sure that we are extra vigilant as we travel throughout town. As always, we urge you to contact the Police Department if you see any unsafe or suspicious activity. Our Police Department is the finest in the area, in part because they work so closely with our residents to keep a close eye on our town.

## Revolutionary War Encampment

Local militia harassed the British by destroying bridges, including the corduroy bridge over King's Highway, cutting down trees to block roads and firing into the lines. The British in turn ransacked homes and businesses, including the Glover House and Glover Fulling Mill which had been built to produce locally made cloth. The British stole food and livestock and ravished the Patriot women. John Hinchman III sided with the British after the Declaration of Independence, reading a protest at the Gloucester County Courthouse. He was literally "run out of town;" and his property in present day Haddon Heights near the Barrington Circle seized.

Three other colonial houses remain in Heights: Colonel Joseph Ellis House on Sycamore, John Glover House on Sylvan and Chalkley Glover

House on New Jersey Avenue. Glover joined the Patriot cause and was "read out" of his Quaker Meeting for his active role. Re-enactors of the 2nd Pennsylvania portray typical troops on both sides. The 2nd Pennsylvania is noted for its valiant service with Gen. Anthony Wayne. During this living history event soldiers will set up camp and campfires, service equipment, prepare foot conduct drills and speak with local patriots. Patriot women will prepare and cook meals.

The Encampment is free. A one hour Walking Tour will take place at 2:00 p.m. Historical markers describing the history of these houses were placed, with the owners' permission, by the Historical Society this spring. ## A Message from the Fire Department

How prepared are you in the event of a major storm? Are you really prepared? Late summer and early autumn are historically the worst months of the Hurricane season, and the recent strikes of Irene and Sandy remind us, sadly, we are not immune locally.

Have you discussed an emergency plan of action with your family in case of evacuation or long term power outages? Do you have an emergency kit ready? Don't wait until its too late. It's recommended that you have one ready that includes a 3 day supply of non-perishable food, water, first aid supplies, batteries, flashlights, and local maps. You should have a battery operated AM/FM radio, and at least one charged cell phone, if possible, to keep you informed of emergency alerts and conditions. Portable generators should only be used if necessary, and should not be operated indoors, or in an adjoining

garage.

## Haddon Heights Named One of the Top 100 Towns in New Jersey

In its September issue, *New Jersey Monthly* named Haddon Heights one of the Top 100 Towns in New Jersey. Haddon Heights came in at No. 86, the only town in Camden County to make the top 100. Haddonfield came in at #103, Haddon Township #210, Collingswood #394, Medford #177, Mt. Ephraim #468.

*New Jersey Monthly's* 2013 Top Towns list considers five categories to represent the quality of life in 514 of New Jersey's municipalities: home values, property taxes, crime rate, school performance and lifestyle factor. Researchers at Leflein Associates ranked the towns on the following indicators: average residential tax bill (2012); change in average property tax bill (2010-2012); effective property tax rate for 2012; median home sales price (2012); change in median home sales price (2010-2012); total crime rate (2011) combined with a score for violent crime rate (2011); student proficiency on state-mandated standardized tests for students in grades 4, 8 and 11 (2012); and a lifestyle factor that considers the

number of acute-care hospitals and live performing-arts theaters within 10 miles of the municipality's zip code, number of full-service restaurants within two miles of the zip code, and average commute time for those working away from home. Extra weighting was given to the following indicators: change in average tax bill; change in median home sales price; and results on standardized tests for students in grades 4 and 8.

We are delighted to be recognized and congratulate our Borough and school officials, employees and businesses, along with nearby medical and arts communities that make Heights such a wonderful, complete small town place to live. If you know someone thinking of moving, suggest Haddon Heights. Tell them, "It's one of the Top 100 Towns in New Jersey according to *New Jersey Monthly* and the only Camden County town to make the Top 100 list."



## Hitch A Ride To Village Playbox For Their 74th Season

Village Playbox of Haddon Heights is pleased to present their 2013 – 2014, 74th Season, “Laughter, Love & Life” said Playbox President, Steve Allen. Arsenic & Old Lace, The Fantasticks and Be My Baby. “These three pieces of theatre entertain the audience as we look at life through the eyes of love and laughter. From the love of the characters, to the love of romance, to those who love life, we hope you will join us for our 74th season and share in the love and laughter that surround these characters’ lives.”

The season begins this November with Joseph Kesselring’s farcical comedy Arsenic and Old Lace, directed by Haddon Heights resident, Michael Hicks. Hicks brings over forty years experience to his direction of Arsenic and Old Lace and has directed the musicals SRO, Once Upon A Mattress and Musical Moments of Mirth (a musical review). He directed Blythe Spirit and has co-directed or choreographed many shows with Haddonfield Plays & Players and Spotliters. Written in 1939, Arsenic has become best known through the film adaptation starring Cary Grant and directed by Frank Capra, the play revolves around Mortimer Brewster, a drama critic who must deal with his crazy, homicidal family and local police in Brooklyn, NY. He debates whether to go through with his recent promise to marry the woman he loves. His family includes two spinster aunts who have taken to murdering lonely old men by poisoning them with a glass of home-made elderberry wine laced with arsenic, strychnine, and “just a pinch” of cyanide; a brother who believes he is Theodore Roosevelt and digs locks for the Panama Canal in the cellar of the Brewster home (which then serve as graves for the aunts’ victims); and a murderous brother who has received plastic surgery performed by an alcoholic accomplice, Dr. Einstein (a character based on real-life gangland surgeon Joseph Moran) to conceal his identity and now looks like horror-film actor Boris Karloff. The film adaptation follows the same basic plot, with a few minor changes. Director Hicks says, “I have always loved

farce. Both watching and acting it. When the opportunity came up to direct a classic like Arsenic and Old Lace I was immediately taken with the idea and started planning sets and blocking without even having reread the script yet. I guess it’s a no brainer as to why I want to direct this show.” Arsenic and Old Lace plays November 1 - November 16, 2013 - Fridays/Saturdays at 8 p.m. and Sundays at 3 p.m.

Our 2013 - 2014 Season continues in February with John Blackwell directing The Fantasticks. The show’s original off-Broadway production ran a total of 42 years and 17,162 performances, making it the world’s longest-running musical. It tells a story, loosely based on the play The Romancers by Edmond Rostand, concerning two neighboring fathers who trick their children, Luisa and Matt, into falling in love by pretending to feud. The fathers hire traveling actors to stage a mock abduction, so that



Matt can heroically seem to save Luisa, ending the supposed feud. When the children discover the deception, they reject the arranged love match and separate. Each then gains disillusioning experiences of the real world, seen in parallel fantasy sequences. They return to each other bruised but enlightened, and they renew their vows with more maturity. Director John Blackwell describes the “The chance to direct at Village Playbox again and create a very intimate feeling that will be both exciting and rejuvenating

for me as a director. The fact that you are so close to them makes it feel as if you really are there in their world. It was this kind of experience that first drew me into theatre” The Fantasticks plays January 31- February 15, 2014, Fridays/Saturdays at 8 p.m. and Sundays at 3 p.m.

Be My Baby, by Ken Ludwig, will be the final production of the season and will be directed by Village Playbox President, Steve Allen. The play tells the story of an irascible Scotsman and an uptight English woman, John and Maude, both in their late 50s, who are unexpectedly thrown together on the journey of a lifetime. John and Maude are brought together when his ward marries her niece. Then, when the young couple decides to adopt a new born baby, the older couple has to travel 6,000 miles to California to pick up the child and bring her safely home to Scotland. The problem is John and Maude despise each other. To make matters worse, they get stranded in San Francisco for several weeks and are expected to jointly care for the helpless newborn. There they form a new partnership and learn some startling lessons about life and love. “I was drawn to this show by its uniqueness” says Allen. “It moves from one location to another – all over the map; a farm in Scotland, a car, an airplane, a hotel in San Francisco, a cruise ship, a church, a restaurant and so on. Be My Baby has many tender moments, while the characters develop depth in serious and humorous ways. It’s a pleasure to encounter a comedy about two mature individuals. 

## Revolutionary Walking Tour

The Heights Heritage League will hold a brisk two-mile Walking Tour of Revolutionary War Haddon Heights during the Encampment on Saturday, October 12 at 2:00 p.m. beginning in front of the Hinchman-Hurley House on North Park Drive. Rose Fitzgerald will conduct the tour past the four pre-Revolutionary War houses and the archeological site of the Glover Mill. The Hinchman House, the oldest continuously occupied house in Camden County, is shown on Thomas Sharp’s map of 1710. Three other houses remain from the early days of Haddon Heights - the Colonel Joseph Ellis House on Sycamore, the John D. Glover House on Sylvan and the Chalkey Glover House on New Jersey Avenue. The Col. Ellis House appears on a map painted on the wall of the Constitution Center in Philadelphia, noted Mrs. Fitzgerald, a copy of a 1787 map of the area. The houses are privately owned and listed on the State and National Register of Historic Places.

The remains of the Glover Fulling Mill will be pointed out. The mill is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as an archeological site. The fulling mill was the first industry in the area - used to wash, process, dye and stretch fabric that had been woven by local women. Betsy Ross, of nearby Gloucester, was a customer of the mill and, reportedly, the fabric for the first flag was fullled there.

The walk is free and should take about 90 minutes, rain or shine. All are welcome to attend. People interested in driving to the four houses are also welcome. Call 547-3950 with questions. A brochure describing the history of these houses is available at the Haddon Heights Library.



## Architectural Survey Meeting

A meeting was held on July 17 in the Borough Hall to present the results of the Architectural Survey, completed by Wise Preservation Planning in 2012. Eight residents who live in the studied area attended the meeting along with a few other interested residents. The Study Area was an 18 block area bounded by Kings Highway to the north, West Atlantic to the east, High Street to the south and Glover, North Park and Tenth to the West.

The purpose of the study was to investigate the potential of a local residential historic district, per the Historic Landmarks Ordinance, either as a separate district or an expansion of an existing one. Seth Hinshaw of Wise showed a Power-Point presentation of individual houses eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places because of their architectural integrity. In conclusion, Wise found the Study Area remarkably intact: there are few areas where demolition has occurred.

The 35 year history of historic districting in Heights began in 1976. The original Architectural Resource Survey was completed in 1986 which confirmed the eligibility of the building stock of the original town for historic district designation. There is no question of the success of historic districting in stopping demolition on the Pike and encouraging renovation/restoration one building at a time along the Pike and Station Avenue. The recommendation of the 1986 Study to include Fourth and East Atlantic Avenues in the White Horse Pike Historic District to "protect the borders" from the busy commercial areas has done its job as these blocks have steadily been renovated and have not been negatively affected by the success of the White Horse Pike and Station Avenue.

The next step will be for the Historic Preservation Commission to study Wise's Project Report and make their

recommendations to the Planning Board. Property owners in the Study Area are encouraged to look at the Survey in the Borough Hall or Library. The process: the Planning Board would notify any owners of a potential district; hearings would result; Planning Board would forward its recommendations to Council. Council would adopt or not.

What is a residential historic district? A residential historic district contains houses that have a sense of time and place, e.g., "This is a really old street," and "These are all 100 year old houses." A historic district does not tell property owners what color to paint his/her house or prohibit owners from making additions to their house or interior changes. It does not prohibit new construction but gives a measure of review against demolition and new compatible construction.

What is the benefit? Historic districting seeks to preserve the original architecture of the houses in the district. Renovations and alterations to existing outside of the house must be done in keeping with the original architectural style. Rear additions are permitted and may be built of artificial materials and in a more modern style; they do not have to match the house.

Historic districting gives property owners a measure of protection that their neighborhood will remain a neighborhood of historic old houses or compatible infill if a new house or substantial front addition is built. Fourth Avenue and the unit block of First Avenue are fine examples. One house on Fourth enclosed its side porch in a style used in the early 1900's. Other houses have added appropriate dormers, restored front porches, replaced slate roofs or had large additions. Historic districting provides the street with a way to protect the neighborhood's visual beauty.






## Margaret Westfield, R.A.


Restoration efforts on this National Historic Landmark began in the 1970s with an extensive structural stabilization and exterior restoration program. Work in the 1980s was limited to the installation of an air conditioning system. With three grants from the New Jersey Trust's Preservation Bond Program, Lucy's Victorian interior was finally restored in May 2000. Before the interior restoration could begin, however, a serious moisture problem had to be addressed — as part of a conditions analysis for the 1992 Preservation Plan, it was determined condensation

was rotting the skin's wooden sheathing and the structural ribs that support it. Resolving the moisture problem necessitated the introduction of new ventilating and humidity controls and replacement/consolidation of damaged wooden elements. Some metal "skin" replacement was also necessary, as were Howdah (riding carriage) repairs and a tusk lift. The interior restoration was based on patent drawings, photographic documentation, and surviving physical evidence of the original 1881 appearance.
