Haddon Heights came in at No. 5 with Chesterfield and Moorestown (Burlington County) and Point Pleasant and New Hanover (and are they really South Jersey?) in the one to four spots. 

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Our New Geographic Information System (GIS)



The plan starting in 2008 was to ensure that the tax assessment issue which occurred in 2007 would never happen again. To do so we put into place several major tactics. One was to hire a new tax assessor to improve processes, two to create a more resident friendly department and three to digitize our Municipal tax maps. We have completed all three tactics with the recent approval of our digital tax maps by the State.

Digital tax maps replaced the mylar hand draw maps that have been used here since the incorporation of the Borough in 1904. Haddon Heights is ahead of the curve with this capability and we have positioned ourselves for the future of how taxes are determined and recorded using digital tax maps. Digital tax maps eliminate error due to human error because the maps need to fit together perfectly or they wouldn't be approved by the State. Going forward our Tax departments will use the maps when determining both property and tax assessments.

As part of the digital tax map process we also commissioned and built a Geographic Information System (GIS). This system provides data rich, interactive maps that when layered create 3-dimensional views into our Municipality. The bottom layer is the digital tax map, which was needed to build the GIS. We have added additional layers of information including but limited

to wetlands, flood plains, soil classification, election districts, zoning map, street index, and drug free zones to name a few. So far we have about 22 layers of information.

These layers can be stacked and manipulated in ways to create views into our Municipality not seen before. These views can provide information for our departments to notice trends and issues before they become real problems. The GIS will greatly improve our construction and zoning departments ability to review parcels, the zones they reside in and other relevant information, from their computer. The fire department will be able to integrate this data into their information systems to assist them with structure knowledge, water flow and fastest routes. The police department will be able to identify trends with crime. The usable information for the Municipality is only limited to the imagination.

MAYOR'S MESSAGE:

First I want to thank all residents, volunteers and employees who contributed to reducing the impact of hurricane Irene on our community and visitors from Wildwood. We lived up to our reputation as "The Friendly Community." We lost power first to 15 homes on 10th Avenue and then 1,200 throughout the middle of town. Both outages were due to large trees falling on power lines and taking out transformers. PSE&G met our call to fix immediately so our residents didn't have to feel the impact Monday morning.

I am focusing this Mayor's Message on current capital projects in the Municipality. Our Borough Engineer's Pennoni have done a stellar job over the last 3 years to bring to light all the improvements you see throughout the Borough. Plus there are many behind the scenes projects that keep the Borough ticking.

Municipal Roads: The 2011 Municipal Road Program which is funded by a \$195,000 NJ DOT grant will address multiple needs. Seventh Avenue from Station to Green will be ground and repaved, and the following intersections will also be addressed: Wynnfield Ave & Maple Ave, Bellmawr Ave & Cedar Ave, Wynnfield Ave & W. High Street.

Public Access Lane: We are investing into the walkway between Anthony's Restaurant and Avanti Salon to make it handicap accessible. We will be adding lighting, drainage and decorative pavers. This lane will be ADA compliant and allow more accessibility from the Station Avenue shopping area to the public parking lot behind the stores on the South side of Station Avenue. A decorative archway will be added on the Station Avenue end to give more visibility to the lane.

Pedestrian & Bicycle Walkway: This project will add sidewalks from High Street to the NJ American Water pump station on West Atlantic Avenue and from

West Atlantic Avenue to 7th Avenue along Lippincott Lane. It will also repair damaged sidewalks from Station Avenue to Kings Run on East Atlantic. Decorative lighting similar to that on Station Avenue will also be added on both East and West Atlantic Avenues. Pedestrian Safety Enhancements will be added to East Atlantic and Garden, and again at Green Street.

Devon Avenue Remediation: We have submitted remedial action plans to the State in preparation for creating new recreational area behind the tennis courts. This has been another ongoing project but now submitting these plans finally puts our ducks in a row to move into remediation and land development once funding is available. The State cut funding for remediation in 2011 but is expected to replenish in 2012. This will add 4 acres of recreational open space.

Atlantic Avenue Fence: The damaged fence along East Atlantic is going to be replaced. Because of the danger it presents we can no longer wait for this area to be repaired by the County. We will be taking down and replacing the old fence, changing the parking layout and adding decorative planters. This will make the area nicer looking and safer.

Former Public Works Parcel Remediation: The land formerly known as public works is in the process of being remediated in support of moving forward with the Glover Mill Village development. We expect to receive a No Further Action (NFA) certification shortly which means the land is completely free of any environmental issues.

As an engineer I have personally enjoyed putting a renewed focus on capital projects. Because we have managed our capital costs very closely we have been able to design and execute many more projects over the last 4 years.

Our infrastructure both above and below the ground is in a better position, though the Municipality will need to continue to invest into our aging sewer infrastructure.

From the Tax Office

Billing for the 4th quarter 2011 and the first two quarters of 2012 will be sent out by the end of September. Please keep in mind the State of New Jersey has determined it is the homeowner's responsibility to pay the property taxes on time and the absence of a tax bill does not prevent interest from accruing. Taxes are due on the first of February, May, August and November with a ten day grace period.

Again, please keep in mind, if you are utiliz-

ing the drop box outside of borough hall and pay on the last day, walk your payment upstairs so you do not get charged interest. Often times, payments are placed in the box after the end of the business day (5:00 pm) and will be subject to interest, reverting back to the first.

We haven't had any official notification from the State of N.J. regarding the freeze program. We will keep you posted.

NEW JERSEY MONTHLY's 2011 Top Towns list considers five categories to represent the quality of life in New Jersey's 566 municipalities: home values, property taxes, crime rate, school performance and lifestyle factor. Researchers at Leflein Associates ranked the towns based on: change in median property tax bill (2007-2010) combined with effective property tax rate for 2010; change in median home sales price; total crime rate combined with violent crime rate (2009); student proficiency on state-mandated standardized tests and the lifestyle factor that considers the number of hospitals, live performing arts theaters, and full service restaurants in a 10 mile radius and the average commute time for workers. With the exception of Chesterfield (47) and Moorestown (73), all of the Top 100 Towns are in North or Central Jer-

sey. Haddon Heights ranked 115; Haddonfield 116; Cherry Hill 190. The full list of rankings is available at njmonthly.com.

Unlike our Classic Towns designation, this is not an honor for which we applied. We are delighted to be recognized and congratulate our Borough and school officials, employees and businesses in Haddon Heights, along with nearby medical and arts communities that make Haddon Heights such a wonderful, complete small town place to live. Preparing for Fall

As fall approaches, marinas and campgrounds will be closing. Please do not bring your boats and campers home for the winter unless you can store them in a garage as storage of these vehicles in Haddon Heights is prohibited by Borough Code 450-18.

trailers, campers, boats, construction equipment and non-licensed vehicles.

Another autumn issue is leaf cleanup. It is a violation of code to deposit anything in the street, including but not limited to: leaves, brush and trash. These items impede traffic and storm water flow causing street flooding, a potential safety hazard, and can cause property damage.

Storm Water Pollution

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking supplies and the oceans and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, and grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Storm water pollution is one of our greatest threats to clean and plentiful water and that's why we all have to do something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes

in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of our storm water. It all adds up to cleaner water, and saves the high cost of cleaning up once it is dirty.

As part of our initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, Haddon Heights has adopted ordinances prohibiting various activities that contribute to storm water pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines and other penalties.

ENFORCEMENT OF BACKFLOW PREVENTER TESTING – GOOD FOR THE GENERAL PUBLIC

Since the adoption of the Uniform Construction Code in the mid 1970's and its incorporation of the National Standard Plumbing Code, the installation and testing of backflow preventers has been a requirement for all cross connections to the supply of drinking water. An example of a cross connection would be a building that has its heat

supplied by a hot water boiler, whether it be radiators or radiant floor heat. It is basically a closed section of water piping in the dwelling's water supply that could re-enter the drinking flow in the event of a drop in water pressure.

A drop in pressure could occur in many ways. It could arise from a break in a water main or even from the demand on the water supply by a fire fighting situation when hydrants are opened for a major discharge of water. Without a backflow preventer, and with a pressure drop at the supply level, contaminated water from a closed off re-circulating zone, like radiators, would be allowed to re-enter the drinking water lines and then come out of one's sink faucets. This water (basically stagnant water) has a build up of contaminants and bacteria that could cause illness, or worse, to anyone who might consume it. The backflow preventer is basically a check valve to prevent the contaminated water from

“backing up” or re-entering the drinking supply.

In 2008, the current governing body set forth goals and objectives for the Borough's Construction and Code Enforcement Departments. In addition to being more accessible, more efficient, and “user friendly” to Borough residents, it was mandated that the Regulations as set by the State and Borough Code would be enforced as intended. This often falls by the wayside in many small towns where officials are part-time, and staffing is kept at a minimum.

There are reasons why Haddon Heights has been a desired destination for decades, and re-dedication to compliance with established rules and regulations will promote its continuation. The health, welfare, and safety of its residents will continue to be a priority.

Colonel Joseph Ellis House on Sycamore, John Glover House on Sylvan and Chalkley Glover House on New Jersey Avenue. Glover joined the Patriot cause and was “read out” of his Quaker Meeting. Ellis enlisted with the New Jersey Militia and fought with the Gloucester County Militia and is frequently mentioned in “The Gallant Men of the Delaware River Forts,” fighting at Fort Mercer, and Cooper’s Creek.

Haddon Heights is a registered town in the Crossroads of the American Revolution, a National Heritage Area between Philadelphia and New York. Troops fought in this corridor to protect or sabotage movement between these cities. Local militia harassed the British by destroying bridges, including the corduroy bridge over King’s Highway, cutting down trees to block roads and firing into the lines. The British in turn ransacked homes and businesses, including the Glover House and Fulling Mill, and stole food and livestock

and ravished the Patriot women. This war was fought on our own soil.

Re-enactors of the 2nd Pennsylvania portray typical soldier life. This unit was noted for its valiant service with Gen. Anthony Wayne. During this living history event soldiers will set up camp and campfires, service equipment, prepare foot conduct drills and speak with local compatriots. Patriot women will prepare and cook meals. Cannons and muskets will be fired.

Refreshments, musket balls and Continental money will be available for sale. The Encampment is free, rain or shine. A one hour Walking Tour will take place at 2:00 p.m. A brochure describing the history of these houses is



available at the Library.

Active vs. Passive Portfolio Management

One of the longest-standing debates in investing is over the relative merits of active portfolio management versus passive management. With an actively managed portfolio, a manager tries to beat the performance of a given benchmark index by using his or her judgment in selecting individual securities and deciding when to buy and sell them. A passively managed portfolio attempts to match that benchmark performance, and in the process, minimize expenses that can reduce an investor’s net return.

Each camp has strong advocates who argue that the advantages of its approach outweigh those for the opposite side.

Active investing: attempting to add value: Proponents of active management believe that by picking the right investments, taking advantage of market trends, and attempting to manage risk, a skilled investment manager can generate returns that outperform a benchmark index. For example, an active manager whose benchmark is the Standard & Poor’s 500 Index (S&P 500) might attempt to earn better-than-market returns by overweighting certain industries or individual securities, allocating more to those sectors than the index does. Or a manager might try to control a portfolio’s overall risk by temporarily increasing the percentage devoted to more conservative investments, such as cash alternatives.

An actively managed individual portfolio also permits its manager to take tax considerations into account. For example, a separately managed account can harvest capital losses to offset any capital gains realized by its owner, or time a sale to minimize any capital gains. An actively managed mutual fund can do the same on behalf of its collective shareholders.

However, an actively managed mutual fund’s investment objective will put some limits on its manager’s flexibility; for exam-

ple, a fund may be required to maintain a certain percentage of its assets in a particular type of security. A fund’s prospectus will outline any such provisions, and you should read it before investing.

Passive investing: focusing on costs: Advocates of unmanaged, passive investing—sometimes referred to as indexing—have long argued that the best way to capture overall market returns is to use low-cost market-tracking index investments. This approach is based on the concept of the efficient market, which states that because all investors have access to all the necessary information about a company and its securities, it’s difficult if not impossible to gain an advantage over any other investor. As new information becomes available, market prices adjust in response to reflect a security’s true value. That market efficiency, proponents say, means that reducing investment costs is the key to improving net returns.

Indexing does create certain cost efficiencies. Because the investment simply reflects an index, no research is required for securities selection. Also, because trading is relatively infrequent—passively managed portfolios typically buy or sell securities only when the index itself changes—trading costs often are lower. Also, infrequent trading typically generates fewer capital gains distributions, which means relative tax efficiency.

Popular investment choices that use passive management are index funds and exchange-traded funds (ETFs). However, some actively managed ETFs are now being introduced, and index funds and ETFs can be used as part of an active manager’s strategy.

Note: Before investing in either an active or passive ETF or mutual fund, carefully consider the investment objectives, risks, charges, and expenses, which can be found in the prospectus available from the

fund. Read it carefully before investing.

Blending approaches with asset allocation: The core/satellite approach represents one way to have the best of both worlds. It is essentially an asset allocation model that seeks to resolve the debate about indexing versus active portfolio management. Instead of following one investment approach or the other, the core/satellite approach blends the two. The bulk, or “core,” of your investment dollars are kept in cost-efficient passive investments designed to capture market returns by tracking a specific benchmark. The balance of the portfolio is then invested in a series of “satellite” investments, in many cases actively managed, which typically have the potential to boost returns and lower overall portfolio risk.

Bear in mind, however, that no investment strategy can assure a profit or protect against losses.

Controlling investment costs: Devoting a portion rather than the majority of your portfolio to actively managed investments can allow you to minimize investment costs that may reduce returns.

For example, consider a hypothetical \$400,000 portfolio that is 100% invested in actively managed mutual funds with an average expense level of 1.5%, which results in annual expenses of \$6,000. If 70% of the portfolio were invested instead in a low-cost index fund or ETF with an average expense level of .25%, annual expenses on that portion of the portfolio would run \$700 per year. If a series of satellite investments with expense ratios of 2% were used for the remaining 30% of the portfolio, annual expenses on the satellites would be \$2,400. Total annual fees for both core and satellites would total \$3,100, producing savings of \$2,900 per year. Reinvested in the portfolio, that amount could increase its potential

long-term growth. (This hypothetical portfolio is intended only as an illustration of the math involved rather than the results of any specific investment, of course.)

Popular core investments often track broad benchmarks such as the S&P 500, the Russell 2000® Index, the NASDAQ 100, and various international and bond indices. Other popular core investments may track specific style or market-capitalization benchmarks in order to provide a value versus growth bias or a market capitalization tilt.

While core holdings generally are chosen for their low-cost ability to closely track a specific benchmark, satellites are generally selected for their potential to add value, either by enhancing returns or by reducing portfolio risk. Here, too, you have many options. For example, satellite investments might include hedge funds, private equity, real estate, stocks of emerging companies, or sector funds, to name only a few. Good candidates for satellite investments include less efficient asset classes where the potential for active management to add value is increased. That is especially true for asset classes whose returns are not closely correlated with the core or with other satellite investments. Since it’s not uncommon for satellite investments to be more volatile than the core, it’s important to always view them within the context of the overall portfolio.

Tactical vs. strategic asset allocation:

The idea behind the core-and-satellite approach to investing is somewhat similar to practicing both tactical and strategic asset allocation. Strategic asset allocation is essentially a long-term approach. It takes into account your financial goals, your time horizon, your risk tolerance, and the historic returns for various asset classes in determining how your portfolio should be diversified among multiple asset classes.

That allocation may shift gradually as your goals, financial situation, and time frame change, and you may refine it from time to time. However, periodic rebalancing tends to keep it relatively stable in the short term.

Tactical asset allocation, by contrast, tends to be more opportunistic. It attempts to take advantage of shifting market conditions by increasing the level of investment in asset classes that are expected to outperform in the shorter term, or in those the manager believes will reduce risk. Tactical asset allocation tends to be more responsive to immediate market movements and anticipated trends.

Though either strategic or tactical asset allocation can be used with an entire portfolio, some money managers like to establish a strategic allocation for the core of a portfolio, and practice tactical asset allocation with a smaller percentage.



Haddon Heights Alumni Association Names Dave Sandowich as Alumnus of the Year: There are not many high school seniors that imagine coming back to work at the place they have worked so hard to leave. It was no different for Dave Sandowich. His journey, however, not only brought him back to his roots but allowed him to give back to his roots and guide Haddon Heights High School through the transition from the end of the twentieth century into the twenty-first.

This 1972 graduate of Haddon Heights High School was an All-South Jersey guard and linebacker on the football team and played in the memorably tied 1970 Thanksgiving game against Heights' chief rival. He was a key part of the 1970 football team that was honored with membership to the Heights Athletic Hall of Fame.

After high school, he went on to earn a master's degree from Springfield College in Massachusetts where he captained the football team his senior year. He was a Massachusetts Scholar-Athlete and an honorable mention for small-college Little All-American. After college, he began his teaching and coaching career at Cherokee High School. In 1984, after completing his courses in administration at Glassboro State (now Rowan University), he got the call from

Superintendent Ken McGregor inviting him back to his alma mater as an assistant principal. He served in administration at Heights for the next 27 years with 20 years at the helm of the high school.

Mr. Sandowich's tenure at the school has been during a time of great technological change. The school went from typewriters and chalkboards to computers and smart boards. In fact, Mr. Sandowich's desire that the school stay on top of any new developments that would improve learning led to Heights becoming the first school in the area to equip every classroom with smart boards. He was willing to lead his staff through any changes that he felt would help teachers teach better and his students learn more effectively. The institution of block scheduling in the 1990s allowed for more hands-on instruction time and more frequent lab periods and the backwards design model of lesson design made it clearer for staff and students to assess the best ways of teaching and learning.

Mr. Sandowich was uniquely positioned to create and live out his slogan: "Heights - Where Tradition and Progress Meet." Because he was teaching where he had grown up, he had a deeply ingrained sense of the traditions that are part of the Garnet community. He also desired that the school and its students be readied for the

Dave Sandowich and his wife, Sue, have three daughters (who were All-South Jersey field hockey players) and still lives in Haddon Heights.




NEW! LEGO Story time - Coming Soon

Monday, October 17: This program will be of interest to both World War II and railroad history enthusiasts. Mr. Roger Thorne will present "The Transportation of Nazi POWs by the Pennsylvania Railroad during World War II". During WWII, many captured German soldiers were brought to the United States as prisoners of war and interred at POW camps in the West and Midwest. Since New York was a major port of entry for the POWs, the Pennsylvania Railroad got the job of transporting larger numbers of them to their destinations in the interior. This was done on special trains operated solely for this purpose. Mr. Thorne observed and photographed some of these special trains passing through Philadelphia and its western suburbs, principally Paoli. Mr. Thorne's digital program will explain and illustrate many interesting details of this fascinating and not much written about aspect of WWII history.

Monday, November 21: Reading Railroad historian and model railroad expert, Mr. Dick



Foley, will present "Modeling the Reading Railroad in Philadelphia in 1953". A first for the Chapter, this "digital clinic" will illustrate the infrastructure of the Reading Railroad during the early 1950's, when passenger trains were many and steam locomotives still reigned supreme. Mr. Foley will explain and illustrate techniques for modeling this busy railroad, including locomotives, cars and the industries for which Philadelphia is famous.
