Revolutionary War Haddon Heights

Join us for a Walking Tour Saturday, April 23rd

The Heights Heritage League will hold a brisk two-mile WALKING TOUR of Revolutionary War Haddon Heights on Saturday, April 23 at 4:00 p.m. beginning at the Cannons. Rose Fitzgerald will conduct the tour past the four pre-Revolutionary War houses and the archeological site of the Glover Mill. First stop is the Hinchman House, the oldest continuously occupied house in Camden County, shown on Thomas Sharp's map of 1710. Three other houses remain from the early days of Haddon Heights - the Colonel Joseph Ellis House on Sycamore, the John D. Glover House on Sylvan and the Chalkley Glover House on New Jersey Avenue. The Col. Ellis House appears on a map painted on the wall of the Constitution Center in Philadelphia, noted Mrs. Fitzgerald, a copy

The remains of the Glover Fulling Mill will be pointed out. The fulling mill was the first industry in the area – used to wash, process, dye and stretch fabric that had been woven by local women. Betsy Ross, of nearby Gloucester, was a customer of

of a 1787 map of the area.

of nearby Gloucester, was a customer of the mill and, reportedly, the fabric for the first flag was fulled there. The mill and the houses are listed on the State and National Register of Historic Places.

The walk is free and should take about 90 minutes, rain or shine. All are welcome to attend. People interested in driving to the four houses are also welcome. Call 547-3950 with questions. A brochure describing the history of these houses is available at the Haddon Heights Library.

You will learn lifesaving first aid skills, from keeping everyone safe to knowing what to do in an emergency. Along with this you will be shown tips on making playtime fun for you and the kids. You will also learn how to set up your own babysitting "business" like a pro: from job interviews to managing

your business. In a few hours, the experts will teach you and your friends the tricks of the trade, reveal their "sitter survival" secrets, and share tips about getting a job where you live. This fast-paced class is even more fun if you bring a friend!



Summer Rec Program 2016 Counselor Employment Opportunity

The Haddon Heights Summer Recreation Program seeks teen counselors for the 2016 season. Counselors work with Adult Directors to supervise and interact with boys and girls from Kindergarten thru grade 6. Counselors take part in all program activities - active play, outdoor games, crafts, science demos, nature walks etc. Counselors must be at least 16 years of age by June 1, 2016 and have completed at least sophomore year of high school in June.



The Summer Rec work schedule is Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 8 am until noon from Tuesday, June 21 to Thursday, July 21. Counselors should be available all 15 days of the program. Pay is NJ minimum wage (\$8.38 an hour) and all previous counselors must reapply for a position. As a Borough sponsored activity preference will be given to Haddon Heights residents. Haddon Heights, NJ 08035 Attention: Mrs. Lange, by Wednesday, April 15th, 4 pm. There is no "application form"; your resume and all required documents are your application. Because this is a position of responsibility, only applicants with a complete application will be considered for an employment interview. We will acknowledge applications by May 6th and schedule interviews later that month. Training sessions for those hired will take place in June.

Emergency Notification System Change



Haddon Heights Police wanted to make you aware that the Borough and Camden County have a new emergency communications system.

When a crisis affects the Borough of Haddon Heights, County, Municipal and Emergency Management Officials must be able to reach residents instantly with warnings, information, and updates. In order to ensure that residents can be contacted quickly and effectively, the Borough and County have begun using Swiftreach Networks, Inc. as the Emergency Notification service provider.

Swift911[™] in its simplest form is a system that makes phone calls to specific people or areas in the event of an emergency or for sharing important information. All the calls you receive will have the Caller ID of 'Borough of Haddon Heights' or 'Haddon Heights Police Department' or Camden

County Communications.

Whether residents need to be informed of a water main break, approaching storm, State emergencies, or other crisis, the emergency notification system is the most efficient way to reach residents with the news. Residents will benefit from increased safety levels and peace of mind, while community leaders see improved response planning, increased efficiency and proficiency.

2016 Pet Licensing

Renewal forms for the cat and dog licenses have been mailed and are now due. The cost for a spayed/neutered cat or dog is still just \$9.00. The cost for a non-spayed/non-neutered cat or dog is \$12.00. To avoid the \$10.00 late fee, license must be issued on or before JUNE 30, 2016.

Please note that in order to obtain a license & tag you must provide the Borough with current vaccination information from your veterinarian. Also for the borough to be able to issue the license you pet's rabies vaccination **must not expire before November 1st, 2016**. This is a state regulation, if you have questions about the regulation you can find more information about it on the State of NJ's website.

If your pet(s) are in need of getting an updated rabies vaccine, we are again offering a free rabies clinic at the end of April (see information below). If you have questions about the timing of your pets rabies vacation, we recommend calling your vet.

If your pet is in need of updating their vaccination, you can attend at no cost. Both residents and non-residents are welcome. Residents will also be issued their 2016 pet license(s) at the event.

Driving and Parking Near Ballfields

The Haddon Heights Police Department would like to remind residents that spring sports practices will be starting. Therefore after the winter lull you will now notice increased pedestrian, motor vehicle and bicyclist activity near sports fields. Please make a point of slowing down as you drive through these areas. Additionally, we ask that you abide by all No Parking regulations. These regulations were passed to reduce bottleneck situations and to open up sight lines so motorists can see pedestrians, including children.

Our Department will strictly enforce speeding and No Parking violations in these areas.

- Parking is prohibited on Borough streets from midnight to 5:00am.
- Parking Permit applications and renewal applications for 2016 permits must be received by Friday December 18th
- 2016 permits must be displayed by 1/1/2016.

- Whenever there is a warning or prediction of possible snow or ice, ALL on-street parking is denied.

Zoning Department

Borough Code requires zoning approval for, but not limited to, the following projects: Decks, fences, garages, patios, walkways, sidewalks, dormers, and additions. Please be aware that even though you may be doing an exact replacement, zoning is still required.

In addition, if you are located within an historic and / or business district, zoning is required for signs, windows, siding, and roofs. 
One way of helping HHGN to accomplish its goal is to



Trash & Recycling Guidelines Trash:

In Haddon Heights, we pride ourselves on keeping the neighborhoods beautiful. Please help our community stay clean on trash collection day, recycling day and throughout the week. Recycling became mandatory for all of New Jersey in April of 1987 under the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act, N.J.S.A. 13:1ET-1 et seq. In 1987, the states goal was to separate 25% of recyclable materials from the solid waste stream, but recently changed the goal to 60%. In Camden County has been able to achieve this goal by the Camden County Solid waste Plan Amendment 70-8-93, which set the requirements for items to be recycled.

January 1, 2011 the "ELECTRONIC WASTE MANAGEMENT ACT" took effect. With passage of this new law, residents are now required to recycle televisions, laptop & personal computers, and computer monitors known as e-waste. Electronic devices covered under this law are to be disposed of at an approved electronic recycling facility. This is crucial because recycling your electronic devices keeps dangerous materials such as lead, mercury, cadmium, and chromium from being released into the environment. Your Governing Body decided to take a proactive approach by offering an efficient collection site to recycle your e-waste. Beginning August 1, 2013 you can now drop off your e-waste Monday thru Friday from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Haddon Heights Department of Public Works at 514 West Atlantic Ave

Trash and recycling materials should be placed on the curb between 4 p.m. the night before collection and 6 a.m. on collection day. Please respect your neighbors by removing empty containers that day. If you are on vacation, have a neighbor place and remove containers at the appropriate times so your house looks occupied.

- Collected every Monday except Holidays (see list below)
- Empty trash cans need to be removed from the curb on collection day.
- Carpet should be cut and tied into 4-foot bundles not exceeding 60 pounds.
- Discarded wood should be cut & tied into 4-foot bundles not exceeding 60 pounds. Nails should be removed or flattened against the surface to prevent injury to our staff.
- Private contractors must independently dispose of any construction waste or demolition debris that their business generates.
- Trash should be place in plastic or metal containers

to prevent animals from tearing through plastic bags. **Brush:**

Please follow these guidelines on collection day:

- Collected every week (east or west side of town) January to October
- All brush should be cut in 4 foot lengths.
- Place curb side in open containers or tied in bundles weighing less than 60 pounds. Leaves, grass or brush may not be placed in the street.

Grass:

- Collected every Monday April to October
- Place curb side in open containers less than 60 pounds. Leaves, grass or brush may not be placed in the street.

Leaves:

• Collected Nov. & Dec.

• Leaves should be placed on the curb and not in the street

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

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Please Don't Buy Baby Chicks at Easter

Please don't buy baby chicks at Easter. Most retail stores must sell you a minimum of 6 to prevent impulse buying but parents will still buy 6 and get home only to realize they are not legal in their town, they need to have a coop and all that goes with it and then they have a dilemma. The stores will not take them back. Also, you have a good chance of getting a baby rooster. The ordinance in Haddon Heights requires a 150 foot setback and a permit. There are a few residents in Haddon Heights interested in modifying the current ordinance but it takes time to be successful. If you purchase chicks now, you would be violating the current ordinance and risk a fine as well as being forced to get rid of your chickens. For more information about modifying the ordinance to conform with the current backyard chicken movement allowing generally six hens and no roosters, like "Camden County Chickens" Facebook page or contact (856) 858-6644.

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Tax-time Doesn't Have to be Taxing in the Garden

...used to be that there was no garden chore I felt I couldn't do. That was oh, maybe like 20 years ago before -- as I heard it called the other day... "Arthur Itis" became my friend. Cute, right? It should be called "the gardener's malady." I mean really -- What do I expect to



have happened after years of moving wheelbarrows of rock, compost and digging big holes for big trees? But no regrets. Devoting my life to what I love is what I would call I life well-lived and I haven't been stopped from my mission as "Garden Evangelist." This doesn't mean, though, that I continue on the same way I used to. I've learned some tricks along the way.

1. Sharp tools. There is nothing that makes pure drudgery out of gardening work more than dull pruners or shovels. It is well worth the time to keep both clean AND sharp. You can take it on yourself easily--I do my own--or your local hardware store can help. If a pointed shovel is no longer pointed, it's time for a nice, new one. And remember from the safety blog, choose one that is of the right size and weight for YOU;




- 2. On the topic of tools: don't try to use tools for things other than for which they are intended. Girls are very guilty of this, using kitchen knives to open packages, as screwdrivers, etc. A pointed shovel does not create a good or nice straight plant bed edge-- you need a flat shovel; a pointed shovel is not the best tool for mulch--you need a pitchfork;
- 3. Don't over-load the plan for your day. Be very realistic about the garden time budget you have any given week. I say this because I have been guilty of loading up my car with as many plants as it will hold thinking I am going to "have at it" for hours on end. I still do this (fortunately I have a VW Golf so the volume is at least restricted.) However, I do it now more for saving time and gas; nursery trips are big time drains for me and they tend to take longer than I anticipate. Always. So I make my list for what I'm after for the next few weeks ahead, understanding that I will have to "nursery" the plants on my own before they are planted. The order is as follows: trees (if any) and shrubs as the containers are larger and won't dry out as fast; then perennials; next annuals; and last, anything in the edible department;
- 4. Delegate. There are some things worth paying some young, strong, guys to do so you can save steam and stamina for what you like to do best;
- 5. Quit before you get tired. After all, even though it is work, it is supposed to be fun.

Microbeads - Horrible for the Environment

Probably Still in Your Bathroom

A Microbead is a tiny, less than 5 millimeter, particle of plastic that has been added to a large number of personal care products generally used for exfoliating or cleansing, sold around the world. Cosmetic companies apparently found that Microbeads were cheaper than non-synthetic alternatives. The beads themselves (also called "mermaid's tears") are made of polyethylene or polystyrene. Since these almost microscopic particles cannot be processed by our current waste water



treatment plants, they flow from your shower and sink drain directly into the sewer system and into our waterways eventually contributing to the "plastic soup" swirling around the world's oceans. The Microbeads are eaten or absorbed by our sea creatures. Some marine life mistake small plastic as food particles. The marine food chain eventually ends up with humans at its top. That means it is very likely that we are absorbing Microbeads in the food we eat. Microbeads also are not biodegradable and are impossible to remove from the marine environment since they are about the size of a pinhead. Once the Microbeads enter our water supply, they settle on the floor of our lakes and oceans where they attract harmful chemicals like PCBs which adhere to their surface and become concentrated there.

However, those tiny plastic Microbeads you have been rubbing on your face are now outlawed in the United States.

• A bipartisan bill that prohibits selling and distributing products containing Microbeads has been signed by President Obama. The bill is intended to protect the nation's waterways. The law takes effect in July of 2017. The law is called "Microbead-Free Waters Act of 2015". The Act, which passed the U.S. House unanimously in early December signals widespread support for the ban, prohibits the "manufacture and introduction into interstate commerce of rinse-off cosmetics containing intentionally-added plastic Microbeads."

These tiny plastic beads are in hundreds of products ranging from body scrubs to toothpaste. They provide an exfoliating sensation for users and are designed to wash down drains.

In September, a study published in Environmental Science & Technology reported that more than 8 trillion Microbeads were entering the country's aquatic habitats daily. The volume was enough to coat the surface of 300 tennis courts every day.

Most of us probably still have products containing Microbeads in our bathrooms. What should we as responsible citizens do with products containing Microbeads?

• First of all, don't buy any products containing Microbeads. Many manufacturers have already eliminated them from their products and others are slowly doing so. The safest way to get rid of

the stuff is to leave it in its container, tighten the lid, and send it to the incinerator or landfill with your regular trash where it's quite unlikely to escape into the environment. But NEVER, ever, not ever, pour it down a drain or flush it down the toilet, because that's exactly how it spreads into the watershed.

• By the way, to find out if a product contains these deadly beads, check the label for "polyethylene," "PE," "polystyrene," or PS. The organization Beat the Microbead has a list of products known to contain the beads. There are also apps available for your phone to help you.


