Note from your Haddon Heights' Tax Assessor

New Jersey Law requires the Tax Assessor's office to keep all property assessments current. The Assessor's inspector may visit your property if the property owner or their contractor obtained a building permit to build a new building, or update, improve, expand, remodel, redecorate, rehab and/or demolish an existing building located in Haddon Heights.

Please cooperate with the Assessor's inspector who will perform an interior and exterior examination of your home or business, and request information to confirm the type of work done, or to be done, the cost of the project, and the date the job was, or is to be completed. This inspection is in addition to any inspection(s) required by the Haddon Heights Building Inspection Department. The inspector will visit your property unannounced in the day, early evening, or on a Saturday. This method of inspection is very cost effective and I greatly appreciate your help allowing the inspector to collect the data required. The inspectors who work for the Tax Assessor's office are Judith Shoemaker (Judi), Jeffery Scott Pierson (Scott), and myself. Each inspector will wear an official Haddon Heights Borough ID Badge.

Medicare Part B covers the flu shot for seniors, and most other insurance companies fully cover the flu vaccine. All you have to do is come in, fill out a screening and consent form, provide us with your medical insurance information, get the shot and go about your day!

Four Revolutionary War houses can be found in Haddon Heights, said Rose Fitzgerald, Event Organizer. Haddon Heights is a registered town in the Crossroads of the American Revolution, a National Heritage Area between Philadelphia and New York. "The Revolutionary War was a conflict of few great battles but many skirmishes. Troops fought in this corridor to protect or sabotage movement between these cities. Local militia harassed the British by destroying bridges, including the corduroy bridge over King's Highway, cutting down trees to block roads and firing into the lines.

The British in turn ransacked homes and businesses, including the Glover House and Glover Fulling Mill which had been recently built. The British stole food and livestock and ravished Patriot women."

John Hinchman III, whose family lived in the Hinchman-Hurley House for 100 years, sided with the British after the Declaration of Independence, reading a protest at the Gloucester County Courthouse. He was literally 'run out of town;' and his property near the Barrington Circle seized."

Three patriots' houses remain in Heights: Colonel Joseph Ellis House on Sycamore, John Glover House on Sylvan and Chalkley Glover House on New Jersey Avenue. Glover joined the Patriot cause and was "read out" of his Quaker Meeting for his active role. Historical markers describing the history of these houses have been placed, with the owners' permission, by the Haddon Heights Historical Society. A brochure is available at the Library.



When you read this quote, you start to understand how the Haddon Heights Good Neighbors Program operates. This fiscal year, we have helped over 9 families (21 individuals) with rent, security deposits, gift cards, and utility bills. Shedding Light on our Field Complex ... The Value of Teamwork

You may have heard that new lights are coming to the McCullough Field Complex on Devon Ave. What happened?

During routine Borough light maintenance, an electrician on a lift noticed a previously stable wooden light pole was deteriorating from the very top interior.Working with our engineer, we determined that other poles, though also appearing fine at ground level, were showing similar cracks and posed an immediate safety hazard.It was determined that if the top weight were removed from the poles, the fields could be used.The bigger picture would be to expedite a complete light replacement project, which was already in preliminary investigation. This would require pushing the project schedule up while adhering to regulations and using common sense funding to keep costs down.

Phase One: With Council approval, an emergency appropriation of \$11,000 was expended for the removal of light standards .When the fields were able to sustain use of a lift, and the weather cooperated, removal was accomplished and the fields were able to be safely reopened.

Phase Two: Next up was a time consuming exploration of all possible lighting options requiring engineering, discussions with light vendors, out reach to field users for input and contributions and, most importantly, an analysis of potential project costs and the subsequent effect on the town budget and tax paying residents. Legislation to support HHSC fundraising effort at the venue was passed. The HH Soccer Club rented lights for the season while the Borough Engineer put out project specifications for bid. The ensuing responses from contractors made it obvious that substantial funding was needed to move forward. The Borough went back to the drawing board, stakeholders were kept up to date and the HHSC, as the main light users, amped up their fundraising. The specs were re-examined for possible cost savings including considering construction in two phases to allow for staggered field closing and financing over a longer period of time.(It turned that this option would actually add about 20% more to the final costs) Parks and Rec remained committed to off field perimeter lighting and removing the light poles from the center of the complex. Doing this will support better grass growth thru seasonal field rotation, facilitate player and spectator flow between the fields and open up space for the increasing number of recreational soccer players. In addition we gain increased lighting (from 5 to 25 foot candles), more energy efficient fixtures and better overall control of light use. This essential Phase 2 process took time to ensure every actions and timeline complied with all state and local laws ,to allow for ongoing stakeholder input and to continually monitor the municipal debt load and bond rates so that we could finance the project as advantageously as possible.

Phase Three: Following all mandatory legal conditions and with the teamwork of Council, Mayor, Solicitor, the Borough CFO, Bond Counsel, Parks and Rec and HHSC, the project funding options were extensively researched ,worked and re-worked. With

the HHSoccer Club's generous \$51,000 donation and their commitment to help with electric supply costs, we finally were able to secure reasonable funding with limited taxpayer cost. (About \$1.17 a month per household for about 10 years) The financing ordinance went to Council for public comment and approval. Even so,finding grants and donations remains a goal. Then the entire project needed to be rebid based on regulatory time frames and also go to Council for public comment and approval. Only then could we meet with the approved contractor and nail down particulars.

Phase Four: On November 1, with the majority of the High School and HHSC regular season schedule completed, and with proper notice of the State DEP Green Acres Program, the Mc Cullough Soccer Complex on Devon Avenue will be officially temporarily closed and become a major construction zone.

We ask everyone to comply and stay out of the area so that work with high voltage wires and heavy equipment can proceed safely and without interference. With good luck and the cooperation of Mother Nature, we anticipate reopening the fields in the Spring.

This project took time and planning effort but our hometown gains a more versatile and well lit field complex for our residents. As our "community backyard", having such a venue adds value to our town properties and attracts young families to settle in Haddon Heights.

Storm Water Pollution

Storm water pollution is one of N.J.'s biggest threats to clean and plentiful water. With everyone's help we can share the responsibility by making small, easy changes in our everyday lives. There are many common pollutants that we can help keep out of the storm water. This all adds up to cleaner water and it also saves on the high cost of cleaning up once the water is dirty.

Storm water is water that is generated when precipitation from rain and snow melt. It flows over land or impervious surfaces such as paved roads and parking lots and does not seep into the



ground. This run off transports pollutants such as trash, grass, and other things which gather on these surfaces. The water and debris make their way to inlets and then flooding will occur. As a resident, business, or other member of the Haddon Heights community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

- Properly use and dispose of hazardous products (there are hazardous waste recycling days that are normally set up each year, please contact the Public Works Department for a list of those days 856-546-2580)
- Keep pollution out of storm drains (do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a storm water system)
- Clean up after your pet (pet waste pollutes our waters when left on the ground, animal waste contains high concentration of nutrients as well as bacteria and disease-causing microorganisms that can cause problems)
- Don't litter
- Dispose of yard waste properly
- Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides



SUSTAINABLE HADDON HEIGHTS COLLECTING PLASTIC CAPS Sustainable Haddon Heights is pleased to announce that they are now collecting plastic bottle caps. Most residents do not know that the caps that come on so many products such as milk cartons, detergent containers and liquids such as soda and water cannot be put in the recycling bucket. To help keep these caps out of the landfill waste, Sustainable Haddon Heights is now collecting them. Please save the caps for the group and bring them to the farmers' market or to the library both now as well as after the market closes the end of October. This is the information about the program: The Ecocap Movement, a Japanese nonprofit organization (NPO) in Yokohama, Kanagawa Prefecture, established in 2007, has been engaged in the donation of polio vaccines to children in developing countries through the collection and sale of plastic bottle caps to recycling companies.

Schools, local governments and companies collect caps and bring them to community organizations specified by the NPO. When Ecocap receives a certain amount of caps, the caps are sold to recycling companies. The profits are then donated to Japan Committee Vaccines for the World's Children (JCV) to buy vaccines. Every 800 caps pay for one vaccination, which costs 20 yen (about U.S.\$0.20).

Currently, a large amount of polyethylene terephthalate (PET) bottles are used. However, caps are made from plastics with different hardness, allowing them to attach firmly to the bottles. Because materials for caps are different from the PET bottles, they cannot be recycled together. When caps are mixed with other garbage, they release carbon dioxide during combustion, and soil contamination after burial. By collecting caps separately and recycling them, they can be reused in concrete panels, ballpoint pens and chopsticks. Web address: http://www.japanfs.org/en/news/archives/news_ id028897.html

The group will be having demonstrations on various aspects of sustainability and gardening. Currently, the "Stop Using Plastic Bags" project is underway. Stop by the table after you make your purchases at the market. For each reusable bag you have used, receive an entry into the weekly contest to win a reusable produce bag. Due to demand for the bag, they now also have them for a donation of \$3, less than cost, for anyone who wants them. Many people use the traditional reusable bags at the grocery store but then take many of the small plastic bags in the produce department. They are the least reused bags! These reusable produce bags take the place of the small plastic bags. Forgot your reusable bag, stop by the booth and get a free one to use shopping. It is yours to keep or you can return at a later date. REMEMBER TO BRING YOUR PLASTIC BOTTLE CAPS.

The tentative schedule is:

October 1: Fall Festival - Sustainable Haddon Heights will be participating and have the storm water run-off and heat dome effect models from the Franklin Institute designed for kids and parents alike to participate in learning about these important topics. The Plastic Bag monster will be present so get ready for selfies!

October 2: Planting for Pollinators -Horticultural Society of South Jersey joins the group to discuss plants for pollinators. Seeds will be available for donation so you can help attract pollinators to your garden.

October 9: Fall Gardening - Don't be in such a rush to cut back all your plants in the fall. Learn about saving time and energy while helping wildlife survive through the cold months by leaving seed pods and shelter locations for them.

October 16: "Earth 911" - How to get rid of "Stuff". Where can you get rid of all your clutter?

October 23: Plastic Bags - a visit from the plastic bag monster to remind you not to take any unnecessary plastic bags. The average American receives over 700 plastic bags a year and most are not reused or recycled. The solution is to "REFUSE" them by carrying one item or taking reusable bags with you when you shop.

October 30 - Play the "Is It Trash or Is It Recycle" game. Most residents do not dispose of their recyclables in the proper manner. For example, are corks recyclable? We know, do you?

Be on the Lookout for the Plastic Bag Monster! Have you seen the Plastic Bag Monster? It has been seen roaming the streets of Haddon Heights recently. Perhaps one even lives at your house. It takes about 500 plastic bags to spawn a Plastic Bag Monster. That's about what the average person takes home in a year. Unfortunately, only about 10% of plastic bags are recycled. The rest end up in the landfill, where they will remain forever, or littering the landscape and ocean. Plastic does not biodegrade but photodegrades, meaning that it breaks down into smaller and smaller pieces when exposed to sunlight, but never goes away. Just like diamonds, plastic bags are forever. Many plastic bags will end up in the Great Pacific Garbage Patch, a floating collection of plastic and trash, 80% of which came from land. Its size is estimated to be somewhere between twice the area of Texas to the size of the continental U.S. In some parts of the ocean, the concentrations of plastic is 40 times greater than that of plankton. Marine animals consume the plastic along with the plankton, causing many to die while others become entangled in it. Some of the plastic bags will remain in the landscape, caught in trees or littering the streets, with taxpayers footing the bill to have them removed. Others will be improperly recycled in single-stream collections, where they will become ensnared in the processing equipment, requiring costly manual removal.

Here's some things you can do to reduce the population of Bag Monsters and the problems they cause:

- 1. Get in the habit of taking reusable bags with you when you shop.
- 2. Don't use plastic produce bags. Sustainable Haddon Heights is offering reusable produce bags at a subsidized cost of \$3 each. You can pick them up at our table on Station Avenue on Sunday mornings between 9:30 AM and 1 PM or at our booth at the Fall Festival, Saturday, October 3.
- 3.4% of landfill is dog poop in plastic bags and it will be there for generations to come. The EPA recommends flushing pet waste. Use flushable doggie poop bags when you clean up after your pet. They are designed to dissolve in water. Flushable cat litter is also available.
- 4. Be sure to properly recycle any plastic bags you do use. Place them in the collection containers at most grocery stores. Do not put them in with your single-stream recyclables.

Ways to Reduce Food Waste and Save Money

20% of the food consumers purchase goes uneaten. Reducing this waste will enable you to spend less on food. Here's some tips that Sustainable Haddon Heights has gathered that you might find helpful in reducing your food waste.

Make sure your refrigerator temperature is between 34 and 40 degrees. Freezers should be set to zero. While cold temperatures can't destroy the microorganisms that cause food to spoil, it slows down food spoilage. If you find that you frequently forget about items in your refrigerator or freezer, organize them so they are more visible. Perhaps something as simple as a lazy Susan will prevent items from disappearing in the back of the refrigerator. Properly store the groceries you purchase so they will last longer. As a general rule, do not wash produce until ready to use. Do not store meat and produce together. Here's some tips for storing specific items.

The USDA estimates approximately • Bananas: Wrap the crown in plastic and store on countertop away from sunlight. • Bread: Freeze what will not be consumed in a day. Do not store in refrigerator.

> • Berries (blackberries, blueberries, raspberries, strawberries): Place in solution of one part vinegar to three parts water, drain, rinse, spin gently in salad spinner lined with several layers of paper towels, store in paper towel-lined container in refrigerator.

• Broccoli: Wrap in foil or place stalks in water and store in refrigerator.

• Celery: Wrap in foil and store in refrigerator.

• Eggs: Store in the refrigerator, but not on the door. To determine whether an egg is fresh, immerse it in a pan of cool, salted water. If it sinks, it is fresh, but if it rises to the surface, throw it away.

• Lettuce: Wrap in foil and store in refrigerator.

• Milk: Store on the middle shelf of the refrigerator and not on the door.

• Mushrooms: Keep in original container or in a brown paper bag if purchased loose. • Potatoes: Store in a cardboard box, paper or mesh bag, away from onions, in a dark place. Potatoes store best at between 45 and 50 degrees. Do not store in refrigerator. A wine refrigerator is OK, but some feel it affects the taste of the wine.

• A "Best if Used By (or Before)" date is recommended for best flavor or quality. It is not a purchase or safety date.

• A "Use-By" date is the last date recommended for the use of the product while at peak quality. The date has been determined by the manufacturer of the product. It does not mean that the product cannot be used after that date. However, remember the old adage, "If in doubt, throw it out".

Track what is being thrown out. It will make you mindful of what you are discarding. Perhaps you should purchase less of these items.

Plan meals and purchase accordingly. While this may take a little upfront time, you won't have to think about what to have for dinner and whether or not you have the necessary ingredients.

Rather than throwing spoiled food in the trash, where it will remain for generations in the landfill, consider backyard or worm composting for spoiled produce.
