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Walking Tour of Revolutionary War Haddon Heights



Haddon Heights Had Both!!!!

The Heights Heritage League will hold a brisk two-mile WALKING TOUR of Revolutionary War Haddon Heights on Saturday, June 10 at 10 a.m. beginning at the Cannons. Rose Fitzgerald will conduct the tour past the four pre-Revolutionary War houses and the

archeological site of the Glover Mill. First stop is the Hinchman House, the oldest continuously occupied house in Camden County, shown on Thomas Sharp's map of 1710. Three other houses remain from the early days of Haddon Heights - the Colonel Joseph Ellis House on Sycamore, the John D. Glover House on Sylvan and the Chalkley Glover House on New Jersey Avenue. The Col. Ellis House appears on a map painted on the wall of the Constitution Center in Philadelphia, noted Mrs. Fitzgerald, a copy of a 1787 map of the area.

The newly fenced in remains of the

Glover Fulling Mill will be pointed out. The fulling mill was the first industry in the area - used to wash, process, dye and stretch fabric that had been woven by local women. The mill and the houses are listed on the State and National Register of Historic Places.

The walk is free and should take about 90 minutes, rain or shine. All are welcome to attend. People interested in driving to the four houses are also welcome. Call 547-3950 with questions. A brochure describing the history of these houses is available at the Haddon Heights Library.

BORO BITS

Tax Assessor Office

New Jersey Law requires the Tax Assessor's office to keep all property assessments current. The Assessor's inspector may visit your property if the property owner or their contractor obtained a building permit to build a new building, or update, improve, expand, remodel, redecorate, rehab and/or demolish an existing building located in Haddon Heights. Please cooperate with the Assessor's inspector who will perform an interior and exterior examination of your home or business, and request information to confirm the type of work done, or to be done, the cost of the project, and the date the job was, or is to be completed. This inspection is in addition to any inspection(s) required by the Haddon Heights Building Inspection Department.

The inspector will visit your property unannounced in the day, early evening, or on a Saturday. This method of inspection is very cost effective and I greatly appreciate your help allowing the inspector to collect the data required. The inspectors who work for the Tax Assessor's office are Judith Shoemaker (Judi), Jeffery Scott Pierson (Scott), and myself. Each inspector will wear an official Haddon Heights Borough ID Badge.

Driving & Parking Near Ballfields

The Haddon Heights Police Department would like to remind residents that spring sports are now in full swing. Therefore after the winter lull you will now notice increased pedestrian, motor vehicle and bicyclist activity near sports fields. Please make a point of slowing down as you drive through these areas. Additionally, we ask that you abide by all No Parking regulations. These regulations were passed to reduce bottleneck situations and to open up sight lines so motorists can see pedestrians, including children. Our Department will strictly enforce speeding and No Parking violations in these areas.

2017 Pet Licensing

Cat and Dog Licenses are due to be renewed. The cost for a spayed/neutered cat or dog is still just \$9.00. The cost for a non-spayed/non-neutered cat or dog is \$12.00. To avoid the \$10.00 late fee, license must be issued on or before JUNE 30, 2017

Please note that in order to obtain a license & tag you must provide the Borough with current vaccination information from your veterinarian. Also you pet's rabies vaccination **must not expire before November 1st, 2017** for us to be able to issue the license. This is a state regulation and you can find more information about it on the State of NJ's website.

Zoning Department

With the arrival of warmer weather, many homeowners will be starting outdoor projects. Borough Code requires zoning approval for, but not limited to, the following projects: Decks, fences, garages, patios, walkways, sidewalks, dormers, and additions. Please be aware that even though you may be doing an exact replacement, zoning is still required.

In addition, if you are located within an historic and/or business district, zoning is required for signs, windows, siding, and roofs. If you are contemplating a project and are unsure of what is required, please call the Service Operations Center 856-546-2580 and ask to speak to the zoning officer Ron Newell.

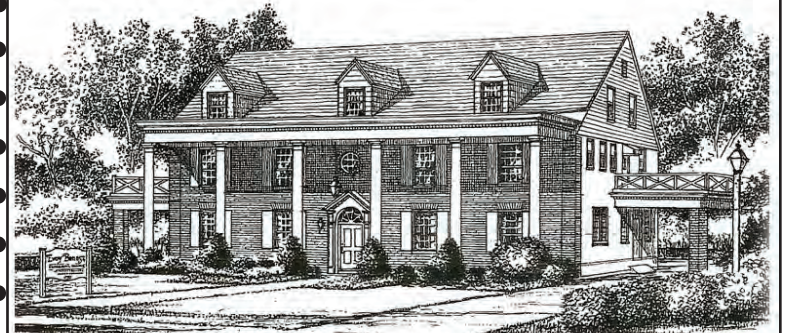

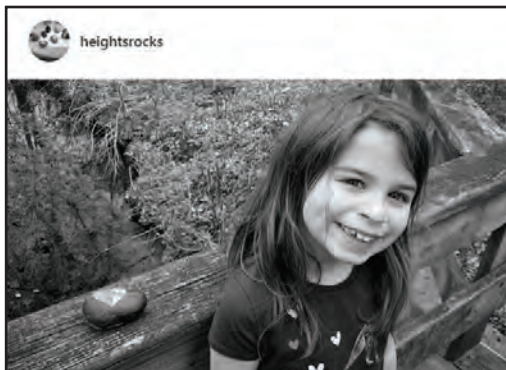

Hens Will Be Coming to Heights

Sustainable Jersey, as an Innovative Project since the statewide organization views having backyard hens as sustainable.

The group began its education of the residents at the farmers' market and Harvest Festival by collecting the names of potential hen keepers as well as supporters of an ordinance change. Gwenne brought her two legal Haddon Township hens to the market several times to get interest in the project. They even layed eggs several times while at the market and always drew a large crowd to the tent.

The end of January, the interested potential hen keepers met for the first time to discuss the proposed pilot. They looked at other pilots in the local area and came up with one that seemed to best fit Haddon Heights. After several meetings, the pilot was introduced by Councilman Steve Berryhill with support from Councilman Bryan Schroeder. The group made themselves available for all questions at the caucus meetings. With minimal changes from the initial pilot program submitted by the group, it was approved.

Several key requirements include a mandatory 2 hour class on "The Basics of Raising Backyard Hens in the Suburbs" and two home visits—one before the coop is erected to verify the yard passes the requirements and one after it is erected before purchasing hens to be sure it is large enough with proper light and ventilation for happy hens. There is a \$25 licensing fee per coop for the two year pilot. Once those requirements are met, a license can be issued by the borough. The program will be run by a Backyard Chicken Advisory Board comprised of 8 residents, several of whom have experience with chickens. Any complaints would be investigated by members of the board and suggestions made and education provided for the resident. However, if the problem was not resolved in the required amount of time, the enforcement officer would be called in. As for other important items of the pilot, the coop and run must be at least 20 feet from the windows and doors of the adjacent neighbors and a five foot setback maintained. This recommendation came out of a law review article that came to the conclusion that distance was more important than total lot size.

If anyone is interested in becoming a part of the pilot, there are twenty total slots available. Information can be received from the municipal clerk or by contacting the Sustainable Haddon Heights Facebook page.



In April, council unanimously approved a pilot program allowing up to four backyard hens (no roosters allowed!) for residents of Haddon Heights as long as several important rules are followed taking into consideration both the health and happiness of the hens as well as the health and happiness of the neighbors. It voided an ordinance only allowing chickens if they were 150 feet from all property lines essentially banning them for most residents.

Supported by Sustainable Haddon Heights, the project initially began about a year ago. The group looked into the benefits of having a few backyard hens. Not only do they provide wonderful eggs and the resident knows exactly what foods the hens eat so knows what is in their eggs, but also hens eat just about every unwelcomed insect, provide wonderful fertilizer for gardens and hours of entertainment. Even one member of the board of Sustainable Haddon Heights, Gwenne Baile, has a Therapy Hen which visits nursing homes and works with developmentally-challenged young adults. She now is affiliated with the autism program at the Academy of Natural Sciences in Philadelphia. Gwenne, known as the "chicken lady of South Jersey", founder of Camden County Chickens and Chair of Haddon Township's Backyard Chicken Advisory Board, has advised several towns how to modify existing ordinances to allow a few backyard hens and make the project successful for not only the hen owners but the town itself. Hens are sustainable and environmentally-friendly with no negative environmental impact. They are excellent composters and gardeners and decrease the carbon footprint of the hen owner since not only is there less, if any, food waste going into the waste stream but eggs are local food to the nth degree. Often leaves are used in the chicken run decreasing the leaves put out for the town to remove as well. Hen owners generally do not use any pesticides or chemicals in their yards either.

Sustainable Haddon Heights, having been involved in the program's inception, will qualify for points towards its recertification with

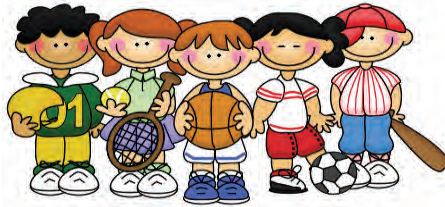

The History of Hoff's Playground:

The Haddon Heights summer playground program started in 1957 at the suggestion of John Shissler, superintendent of public works, and Joe Cervino, a long-time resident of the borough interested in sports and recreational activities. Norman Hoff, a physical education teacher and athletic director at the high school, was chosen to run the program. As the years passed, interest in the program grew, and each season found new equipment and activities added to make the playground more attractive to children in the town. Attendance grew and students were hired as staff to support Mr. Hoff, and the program became a huge success in town. The program ran Monday to Friday for 9 weeks from 9:30 am to 3:30 pm.

Kids loved to play quiet games like chess, checkers and dominoes. Box hockey was played in the 1960's, then Nok Hockey was the hit of the park in the 1970's. Kids were always active with tether ball, paddle tennis, shuffleboard, badminton and whiffle ball games. In the afternoons, there was craft time, with popsicle stick creations, and tile trivets. Painting molds on Friday was the kids' favorite activity of the week.

At its peak, there were two hundred and fifty boys and girls attending on a daily basis. Mr. Hoff ran the program from 1957 to 1980. 2017 represents the 60th anniversary of the original summer program, and many people in town have fond memories of summers in the park.

Small Explorers Playground at Hoff's Park Update



Thanks to community input and many volunteer hours, plans for the Small Explorers Playground project are finalized. The playground will be installed in

two stages, including both the Small Explorers Playground structure and the Kindness Garden. The total cost for the entire project is \$75,000 which will come largely from donated and grant funding.

The Kindness Garden installation will begin first, with the planting of a living play structure, the willow whip tunnel, in late spring to allow the willow to root and grow over the spring and summer season. Other aspects of the Kindness Garden include a labyrinth walking path (constructed out of personalized pavers, stay tuned for information about how to purchase one to support the playground), the Kindness Rock, a reading bench to be donated by the Friends of the Haddon Heights Library and a native plants pollinator garden for exploration and beauty. We are certain that this natural play and meditative area at Hoff's Park will be enjoyed by residents both young and old.

Phase 2 of the Small Explorers Playground project will include the purchase and installation of the toddler play structure. The structure matches the existing color scheme of the playground and will include slides, activity panels, talk tubes, a low balance wall, climbing stumps and a group play spinner, to name a few features. Installation of the playground will occur behind the existing play structure to keep the visual aesthetic of the park and to keep sight lines clear.

Sustainable Summer Yard Care



Summertime can be a difficult time to stay sustainable when it comes to your yard. With a few tips and a conscious effort from the resident, it isn't that difficult to be earth-friendly and save time, energy and money at the same time.

One of the biggest drains on the environment is lawn. Many people long for a lush green lawn. However, the most common blends of grass seed sold in our area are not destined to stay green from spring through fall in our area. As the rains of late spring and early summer decrease, it is perfectly normal for lawn to turn brown. Many homeowners think it means that the lawn has died when in reality, it is simply dormant. Watering at this stage is very wasteful of a limited resource. Some residents even fertilize hoping it will “fix” the lawn or even reseed at the worse time of year.

First of all, lawn and most garden beds only need 1-1 1/2 inches of water a week. Be diligent with watering. It is best to do it in the early morning providing the entire weekly need if possible. Gently sprinkling it for a couple minutes makes the problem worse since it prevents the lawn from forming deep, healthy roots. Watering later in the allows most of the water to evaporate and be wasted. Watering in the evening prevents the moisture from drying and so increases the chance of fungus and other diseases. When that happens, the homeowner reaches for chemicals to “cure” it thus putting more contaminants in the soil. Worse case, they reach for a bag of grass seed

watering even more when the best time to plant grass is in the fall.

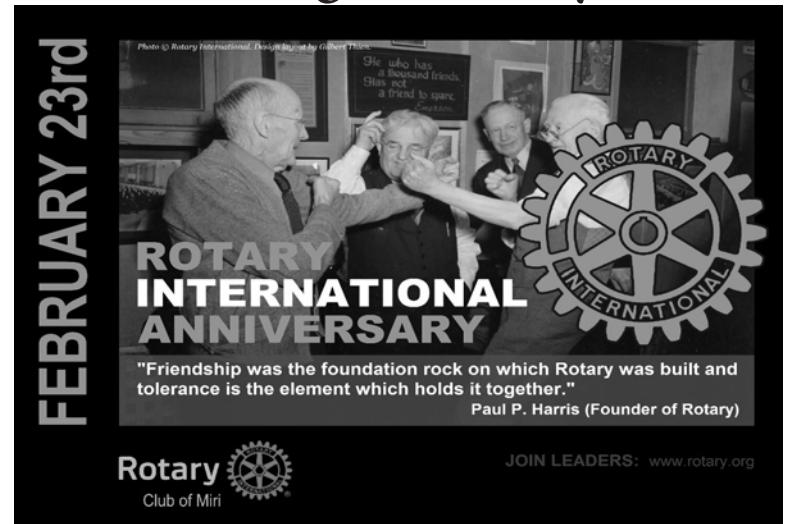
Invest in an in-expensive rain gauge, generally costing less than \$5 or simply re-purpose a clean, standard-size cat food can which is 1 inch high. Be sure to put the rain gauge in an open area where no plantings obstruct collection. Use this as a guide and only water if the weekly total is less than 1 inch or so.

Don't mow the lawn during a dry spell. It just stresses out the lawn. Keep the mower at its highest setting. Lawn after mowing should be 3 inches high. High grass holds more moisture, fights weed growth and helps develop deeper roots. When you mow, do not bag the grass clippings. Leaving them on the ground provides free fertilizer and saves time and effort as well as decreases yard waste put out for the town to “take away”. Overwatering and over-fertilizing create thatch, not leaving clippings on the lawn. Do not fertilize during the hot, dry summer since it can burn the lawn.

Be sure to tell any lawn service how you want your lawn cared for. They often do things “routinely” and not based on the lawn requirements of a hot, dry summer.

Next year, consider decreasing the amount of lawn in your yard by planting drought-resistant ground covers or increasing the size of flower beds with native plantings which generally are drought-resistant once established. Lawn is not sustainable due to its water and fertilizer needs as well as energy use such as mowers and edgers and chemical run-off. While at this point our area has not suffered the severe droughts affecting other areas of our country, it is likely we will feel its affects at some point in time. Now is the time to adapt your lawn routine to a more sustainable one.
