MAYOR'S MESSAGE:

Dear Residents:

The heart of summer is always a fun time in Haddon Heights. Our Fourth of July Parade and festivities were a great success! I would like to thank all the volunteers involved in putting together another wonderful celebration. Council recently approved a Resolution forming a new subcommittee of the Civic Events Committee, chaired by former Police Chief Richard Kinkler, to find ways to enhance future Fourth of July celebrations. I look forward to the Committee's ideas!

You should be receiving your tax bill if you have not already. Despite the increased costs we face as a borough, we were able to keep the municipal portion of your tax bill low, with a small increase of 1.5 cents per hundred dollars of assessed value this year. For example, on a home assessed at \$250,000 translates

to approximately \$37.50 for the year. The maintenance of our infrastructure and the continuance of the level of services you are accustomed to requires careful budgeting. Be assured that we will continue to be fiscally responsible. You will note that your tax bill includes school district and county taxes. Your municipal government has no control over those rates. I was disappointed to hear that the state made a decision that resulted in a reduction to our school district's state aid by approximately \$35,000, just days before the school budget was to be finalized. I am sure our Board of Education will manage the issue however, I hope the state will restore this aid in the near future.

I'd like to thank Councilwoman Kathy Lange for another successful Summer Rec Program. This year, the program was filled to capacity every week, which is a testament to

the high quality of the program. I have heard from many of you about how much your children enjoy the summer rec program, and we're happy to be able to provide it. We would not be able to provide such a high quality, well organized Program without the dedication that Kathy Lange brings to her role.

Finally, you may have heard that Councilman Stephen Berryhill recently resigned from Council after seven and a half years of service. Councilman Berryhill's departure is a true loss to our government. He is a man of solid character who was always dedicated to serving the town and its residents. I thank him for his service and wish him the best in his future endeavors. I would also like to welcome Councilman Christopher Mrozinski, Councilman Berryhill's appointed replacement. I look forward to working with Councilman



Mrozinski along with everyone on Council to continue to ensure our town remains the special place that it is.

- DO NOT mix leaves and brush. Your can(s) will NOT be collected if it is mixed. When the trucks are taken to be dumped the dump can and will refuse our trucks if there is anything mixed in that is not allowed to be. We thank you in advance for your cooperation.

Storm Water Pollution

Isn't strange that we often need to be incentivized to think about some of the world's most pressing issues? Take plastic for an example. Our streets and oceans are riddled with plastic trash-and while we know we need to be better with recycling-we don't often make the connection with why we need to do that. This is where public art comes in with amazing results-and especially so when we are talking about huge three-dimensional pieces, ones that you simply cannot is, no matter how much you try.

Greenpeace Philippines recently created a real... whale of an installation. A giant whale made out of plastic was installed at the Sea Side Beach Resort in Naic, Cavite. It is not there to please your eye, though. The piece shows a dead whale, and once you see what comes out of its open mouth, the cause of death becomes obvious. From the mouth, pours forth a mass of plastic trash-exactly the kind that actually is in the oceans and threatens the lives of hundreds of marine animal species. "Listen to the dead whales wake-up call," Greenpeace Philippines writes on their Facebook page about the great whale, "looks close and see what plastic pollution does to the ocean." The impressive piece was created out of plastic from the community's junk shops. The organization hopes that the installation encourages the public to rethink their relationships with plastic and take action against irresponsible use.

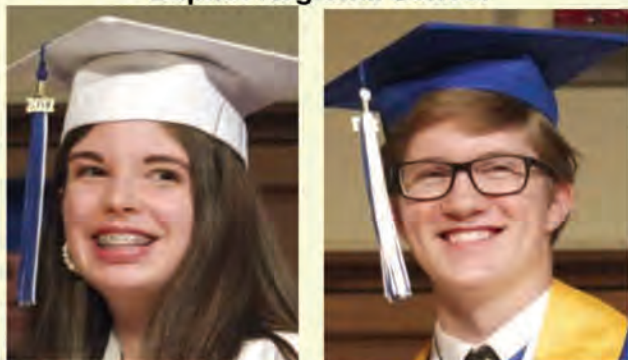

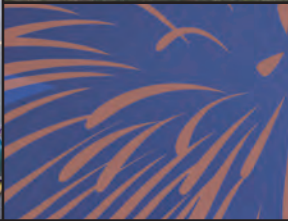

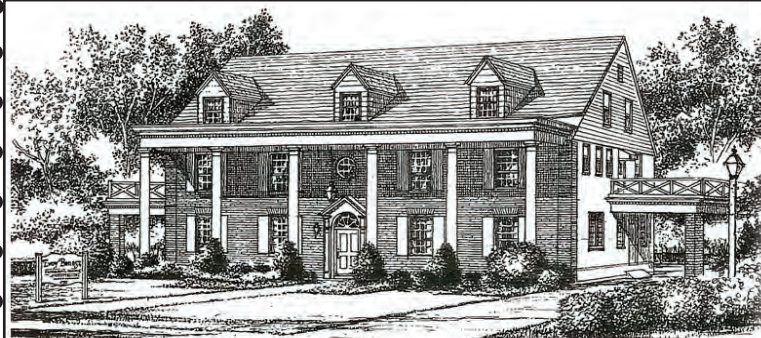

"I don't believe in reinventing the wheel," says Tom Whitman, owner of Del Buono's Bakery. "But I do believe in keeping what's great and building on it."

The Whitmans have installed a state-of-the-art commercial oven and expanded their offerings. Beside a wide variety of rolls, you can also purchase pizzelles, biscotti, cookies, pies and cakes.

Advancing their plan to expand Del Buono's offerings, the Whitmans purchased Carmen's Deli in Bellmawr, known for its excellent hoagies, salads and sandwiches. Over the years, under the ownership of Ron Giglio, the deli has been featured in Philadelphia magazine and has earned 25 awards, including Best Hoagies and Best Deli in New Jersey. All sandwiches, hoagies and cheesesteaks have always been served on Del Buono's rolls. Decades ago, Nino Del Buono was stopped one day by Ron's Mother, Rose Giglio, who asked if he would mind selling her rolls for her deli.

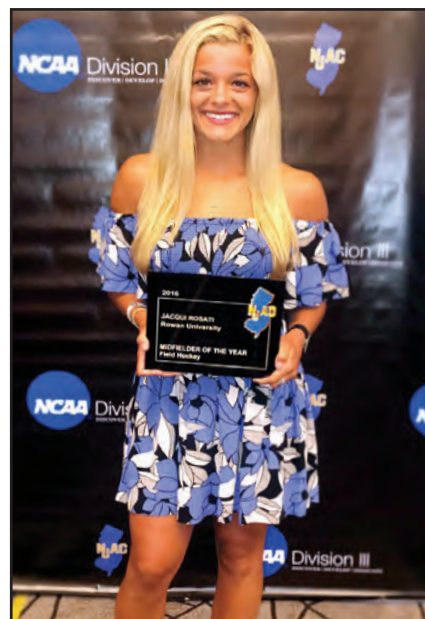

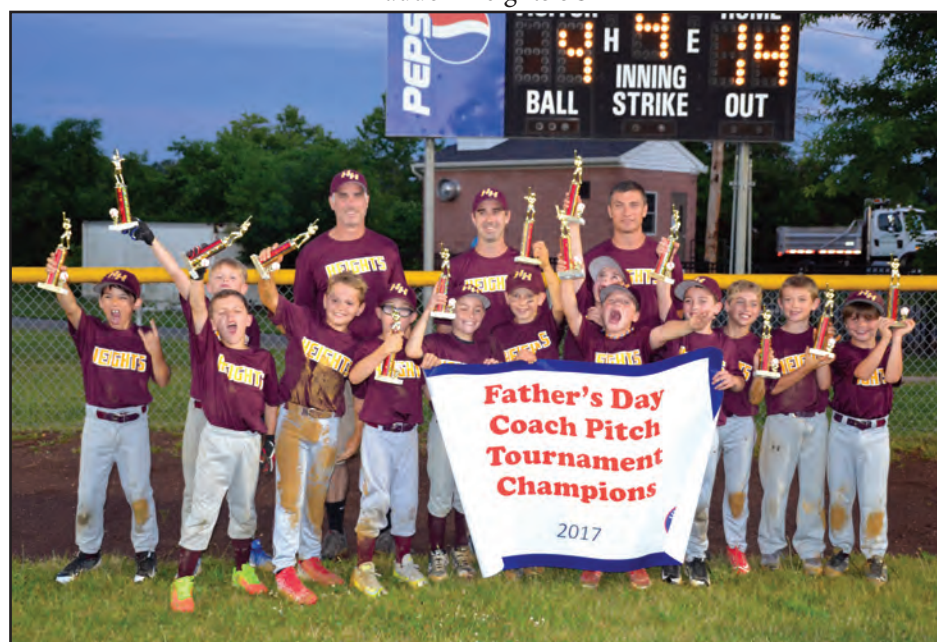

Residential Property Maintenance: lawn and weeds, friend or foe?

There has always been much debate regarding property maintenance and determining whether a lush lawn is entirely beneficial, or is it better to allow nature to take its course. The intent here is not to sway your opinion but rather to consider options when maintaining your property.

The current trend from an environmental standpoint is to reduce water usage and chemical usage when maintaining your property. This can be accomplished through Xeriscaping (landscaping and gardening that reduces or eliminates the need for supplemental water from irrigation). The use of drought tolerant plantings to either supplement or replace your existing plantings and/or entire landscape. In addition to xeriscaping is allowing your existing lawn to go back to nature, which is discontinuing the use of fertilizers and pesticides wherever possible. Fertilizers are one of the largest watershed polluters. In response to this fact, on January 5, 2011, Governor Chris Christie signed into law one of the most restrictive fertilizer content standards in the nation for nitrogen and phosphorus. The law is being implemented in three phases (read additional information at <http://www.nj.gov/dep/healthylawnshealthywater>). Also, consider letting grass clippings to remain on the lawn as they shade the soil surface and reduce moisture loss due to evaporation. In addition, grass clippings recycle nutrients back into the soil and reduce the burden of disposal of the waste. Lastly, consider reducing your lawn size by substituting lawn areas with other plantings. So can you live with weeds in your lawn; yes. Do you have to; no. How about striking a balance? Are we meant to have golf course grade lawns, and are they natural; no. Can a golf course grade lawn be detrimental to the environment; yes, due to use of man-made fertilizers and the wasting and polluting of water.

Identifying which weeds can be beneficial to a healthy lawn can help you reduce fertilizer use. Certain weeds can be beneficial to a lawn and the environmental in general. Weeds promote biodiversity and thereby reduce pest and disease problems. One example is white Dutch clover, which is a legume, meaning it fixes nitrogen from the air and puts it into the soil. Clover also attracts earthworms, which are beneficial to your soil. And even more important, clover attracts honey bees; clover pollen is nutritious and the nectar is abundant. Clover is drought-tolerant, virtually immune to diseases, and distasteful to common turf insects. (Cite: <https://www.rodalorganiclife.com/garden/surprising-weed-will-rejuvenate-your-backyard>)

The dandelion, is it a friend or foe? In New Jersey we actually have dandelion farms, and in Vineland there is a yearly dandelion dinner with beer tasting event! Vineland held their 44th Annual Dandelion Dinner & Beer Tasting this past March. For a description of the event see the following webpage:

So is it wise to banish the technical dandelion weed (dandelion flower to those who believe otherwise that it is not a weed). Various dandelion parts are not only edible; they can also have medicinal qualities. In fact there is cancer research being conducted utilizing the dandelion root. In addition, the dandelion is one of the first bloomers that honey bees use; dandelion pollen is moderately nutritious and the nectar is abundant for bees.

Clover and dandelion are just two examples to show that not all weeds are bad and that some can be quite beneficial. Haddon Heights does have a Borough Code that regulates landscaping to an extent, such as the height of grass, and does forbid noxious weeds and poison ivy; however there is no mandate for golf course grade lawns. We do have options to aid the environment when debating your approach to lawns. In summary, consider Xeriscaping when assessing your overall landscape design. Do not ban all weeds from your lawn or landscape, think of the benefits that certain weeds can provide for our environment. Conserve water, reduce pollutants, and help provide nutrients for bees and other pollinators, while encouraging beneficial insects that aid in reducing harmful insects and diseases that could damage your landscape. Who Ever heard of a Therapy Chicken!



Most everyone has heard of a therapy dog, but a therapy chicken? Yes, there is such an animal and there is one who has made several appearances in Haddon Heights.

Featured on Eyewitness News and a front page article in the Courier Post, Rosebud, the Therapy Chicken has become a little “star”—a Cinnamon Star—the fancy name breeder have given red sex-linked chickens. Rosebud is approaching age two and busier than ever “working” sometimes up to five times a week.

How did all this come to be? Rosebud’s

owner, Gwenne Baile, known as “the chicken lady of South Jersey”, founder of Camden County Chickens, Chair of Haddon Township’s Backyard Chicken Pilot and advisor to Hens in Heights took a course vis Skype as her handler. Unlike a therapy dog, chickens cannot be trained to be a therapy chicken. Chickens can be taught many tricks, that isn’t the issue, but to be a therapy chicken demands a lot more than that. They must be very calm amidst all levels of noise and attention being paid to them. They must be gentle and not peck at anyone. Most of all—they must enjoy their work. How can one determine that? It actually is pretty easy with chickens. One of the factors in a chicken laying healthy eggs regularly is stress. If Rosebud was to become very stressed following an event, she simply would skip a few days laying. She really likes being petted and held and also makes the largest eggs of Gwenne’s four hens. Rosebud actually wears a chicken diaper when visiting indoor venues and the elderly to decrease any issues with feces. Handwashing after touching her is mandatory for everyone.

Gwenne, who teaches the required class for residents to obtain a license in most local towns, had taken over fifty hours of classes before teaching herself. One group, “Chickens and You” offers many

different classes including a Therapy Chicken course. It is an advanced course so she took the basic requirements first. Being a retired RN and Certified Nurse-Midwife, having a therapy hen seemed like a logical next step. She learned many tricks and techniques to make visits safe and happy for all who meet Rosebud. The course included required reading and exams. Interestingly, the closest member of the class to our area was from W. Virginia and there were several class members from Canada. Altogether, 12 were in the class. There are no other therapy hens in our area besides Rosebud.

Rosebud has a regular schedule of assisted living facilities and an adult day care program that they visit but their experiences have blossomed into visiting special education classes in elementary schools and working with the developmentally-challenged population of all ages. Recently, they have become affiliated with the Academy of Natural Sciences Autism program. Farmers’ Markets, Earth Day Events, camps and story times make up the bulk of their visits. In Haddon Heights, they visited the Boy Scouts and participated in the elementary school science fair. You may have met Rosebud and Gwenne at the farmers’ market last year as they increased awareness of the

proposed, now passed, backyard hen pilot in Haddon Heights. You also may have seen Rosebud in the Haddon Heights 4th of July parade with several other Hens in Heights.

Gwenne and Rosebud are committed to being “Chicken Ambassadors” and there never is any charge for their visits or programs. Ways to Reduce Food Waste and Save Money

The USDA estimates approximately 20% of the food consumers purchase goes uneaten. Reducing this waste will enable you to spend less on food. Here’s some tips that Sustainable Haddon Heights has gathered that you might find helpful in reducing your food waste.

Make sure your refrigerator temperature is between 34 and 40 degrees. Freezers should be set to zero. While cold temperatures can’t destroy the microorganisms that cause food to spoil, it slows down food spoilage.

If you find that you frequently forget about items in your refrigerator or freezer, organize them so they are more visible. Perhaps something as simple as a lazy Susan will prevent items from disappearing in the back of the refrigerator.

Properly store the groceries you purchase so they will last longer. As a general rule, do not wash produce until ready to use. Do not store meat and produce together. Here’s some tips for storing specific items.

- Bananas: Wrap the crown in plastic and store on countertop away from sunlight.
- Bread: Freeze what will not be consumed in a day. Do not store in refrigerator.
- Berries (blackberries, blueberries, raspberries, strawberries): Place in

solution of one part vinegar to three parts water, drain, rinse, spin gently in salad spinner lined with several layers of paper towels, store in paper towel-lined container in refrigerator.

- Broccoli: Wrap in foil or place stalks in water and store in refrigerator.
- Celery: Wrap in foil and store in refrigerator.
- Eggs: Store in the refrigerator, but not on the door. To determine whether an egg is fresh, immerse it in a pan of cool, salted water. If it sinks, it is fresh, but if it rises to the surface, throw it away.
- Lettuce: Wrap in foil and store in refrigerator.
- Milk: Store on the middle shelf of the refrigerator and not on the door.
- Mushrooms: Keep in original container or in a brown paper bag if purchased loose.
- Potatoes: Store in a cardboard box, paper or mesh bag, away from onions, in a dark place. Potatoes store best at between 45 and 50 degrees. Do not store in refrigerator. A wine refrigerator is OK, but some feel it affects the taste of the wine.
- Tomatoes: Place on countertop away from sunlight with stem end down or cover the stem end with tape and store

with the stem end up.

Don’t store items that are bruised, overripe, or about to spoil as they will cause other items to spoil more quickly. Use them as soon as possible.

Consider purchasing an ethylene gas absorber to delay the ripening of much of your produce. They cost about \$15. Blueapple and ExtraLife are two such products and are available online and at houseware stores. (This is not an endorsement of these products but provided to assist you in finding this type of item.)

Purchase locally grown produce when possible. Travel time reduces shelf life. Find new uses for excess food. Use leftover mashed potatoes as a base for potato pancakes. Use a food processor to turn stale bread into bread crumbs. Use sour milk in place of buttermilk for pancakes or cornbread.

For storage, use Mason jars instead of plastic containers. They don’t stain and cut produce will last longer. Additionally, you won’t have to worry about being exposed to the BPA that can be found in some plastic containers. Food is also more visible.

Understand the USDA dates on products.

- A “Sell-By” date tells the store how

long to display the product for sale. You should buy the product before the date expires.

- A “Best if Used By (or Before)” date is recommended for best flavor or quality. It is not a purchase or safety date.

- A “Use-By” date is the last date recommended for the use of the product while at peak quality. The date has been determined by the manufacturer of the product. It does not mean that the product cannot be used after that date. However, remember the old adage, “If in doubt, throw it out”.

Track what is being thrown out. It will make you mindful of what you are discarding. Perhaps you should purchase less of these items.

Plan meals and purchase accordingly. While this may take a little upfront time, you won’t have to think about what to have for dinner and whether or not you have the necessary ingredients.

Get back into canning or try drying fruits and vegetables. Purchase in bulk when they are in season. Learn how to freeze items before they go bad. Rather than throwing spoiled food in the trash, where it will remain for generations in the landfill, consider backyard or worm composting for spoiled produce.
