Revolutionary War Encampment

Haddon Heights is a registered town in the Crossroads of the American Revolution, a National Heritage Area between Philadelphia and New York. Four Revolutionary War houses can be found in Haddon Heights, said Rose Fitzgerald, Event Organizer. Three patriots' houses remain: Colonel Joseph Ellis House on Sycamore, John Glover House on Sylvan and Chalkley Glover House on New Jersey Avenue. The one Loyalist House is the John Hinchman House on North Park Drive.

Historical markers describing history of these houses have been placed, with owners' permission, by the Historical Society.

"The Revolutionary War was a conflict of few great battles but many skirmishes. Troops fought in this corridor to protect or sabotage movement between these cities. Local militia harassed the British by destroying bridges, including the corduroy (log) bridge over King's Highway, cutting down trees to block roads and firing into the lines. The British in turn ransacked homes and business, including the Glover House and Glover Fulling Mill which had been recently built. The British stole food and livestock and ravished Patriot women. John Hinchman III sided with the British after the Declaration of Independence, reading a protest at the Gloucester County Courthouse.



He was literally 'run out of town'; and his property near the Barrington Circle seized," said Mrs. Fitzgerald. A brochure is available at the Library.

Glover joined the Patriot cause and was "read out" of his Quaker Meeting. Re-enactors portray typical troops on both sides. The 2nd Pennsylvania is noted for its valiant service with Gen. Anthony Wayne. During this event soldiers will set up camp, service equipment, prepare food, conduct drills and speak with local compatriots. Patriot women will prepare and cook meals. Cannons and muskets will be fired.



HHPD's deploys Social Media effort to stop crime with 9 pm Routine. Even though Haddon Heights is a small town compared to larger communities such as Gloucester Twp, Cherry Hill Twp, and Winslow Twp, burglaries & petty thefts continue to be an issue for our community.

With that in mind, HHPD wants to remind residents to use precautions help themselves & enforcement keep our community



safe. Obviously our main goal to apprehend criminals when they commit crimes, but something as simple as making sure all is secure deters thieves from criminal activity altogether and prevent citizens from becoming victims.

HHPD is encouraging all residents to begin the #9pmRoutine. HHPD read about the Pasco County Florida Sheriff's Office (FL), who originally introduced the #9pm Routine, and HHPD believes it would be successful in Haddon Heights as well.

The idea is to periodically remind residents, through a simple Facebook post or Tweet, to check their property including cars, sheds, front, & back doors every night at 9 pm, assuring they have locked up everything before going to bed. Turning on exterior lights also deters thieves who use the cloak of darkness to commit thefts. HHPD believes these small steps can make a huge difference. Our goal is to make this everyone's "routine" each and every night without a reminder.

HHPD officers diligently patrol and work to catch criminals in the act. However, if a resident locks up their property and removes articles from sight, they apply a tremendous effort in removing a criminal's opportunity even to commit a crime.

Haddon Heights Solicitors License

Solicitors in Haddon Heights are required to obtain a Solicitation Permit from the Borough Tax Office in order to solicit business "door-to-door" in our community. HHPD then does a thorough background check on each and every solicitor, including fingerprinting through the NJ State Police, to assure potential solicitors do not have a criminal background in order to protect our residents and businesses.

If you encounter a solicitor in your neighborhood, or at your front door, they are required to carry and display with them the below Solicitor Identification Card which will have their Photograph

(where HHPD Seal is) on it when issued to them from HHPD. If you encounter a solicitor and they do not have the below credential we ask you to contact the Haddon Heights Police Department immediately to have them investigated.

One tactic burglars use is to knock on doors to see if anyone answers then make up some strange story if someone answers. If no answer they may look for a way to enter in order to commit a burglary.

Be aware of scammers and those illegally soliciting; moreover, call 9-1-1 immediately to summon the police if you feel uneasy about any situation or subject in our community. HHPD would like to thank our residents for being our "extra eyes & ears" in helping keep our community safe.

The Little Free Library movement was started and, I am thrilled to report, has reached our hometown. To date over 1,000 books have been circulated!


Currently, there are four little libraries in Haddon Heights all started by their stewards for individual reasons. Kristen James' library at 7th and Green is a tribute to her mom who instilled in her a love for books and reading. Shannon Raetsch (3rd and High) and Asiyah Kurtz (3rd and Green) installed their libraries to share a love for reading with neighbors. Estyr Bomgardner's library (Sylvan and 13th) was a birthday gift to her from her husband after she spotted one on a wooded path in Virginia.

While these adorable little structures can be purchased as a kit, most people like to build their own and one here in town mimics the shape of the house it behind it. Common sense suggestions to add one to your property include placing it in a safe, visible location that does not overhang the sidewalk or street or obstruct pedestrian traffic. The structure should be sized so that there would be no attempt to enter it, at a reasonable height from the ground and securely attached or anchored in the ground. The owner would need to keep it tidy

> and monitor the donations so that books are suitable for children or adult readers.

We are grateful to these residents for their generosity of spirit and their acceptance of their role as caretakers. When the time comes to add a Little Library to our Kindness Garden at Hoff's Park we will be reaching out for someone to help build a structure - perhaps mimicking the log cabin! CAPS ON!

We have received confirmation from the Boro's recycler that most bottle caps are made from #5 plastic, and are recyclable! However, the recommended method is to PUT THE CAPS BACK ON the bottle for recycling. We no longer have to have special collection containers just for caps. When the caps are loose, they often clog the equipment. The bottles and caps are ground up into flakes, which then allows the recycling process to separate the two types of plastic – bottles are mostly #2, and caps are mostly #5. If you read the Service Operations Facility page in your community calendar, acceptable recyclable materials include #1, #2, #4, #5 and #7 plastics. In 2008 the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC) introduced a new marketing program entitled Classic Towns of Greater Philadelphia aimed at growing, revitalizing and supporting the region's older suburbs. The initiative was initially designed to promote Classic Towns as great places to live, work and play. Haddon Heights was one of the 11 inaugural Classic Towns selected, including: Ambler, Bristol, Doylestown, Lansdowne, Media and West Chester; the Philadelphia neighborhoods of Manayunk and Overbrook Farms; and Collingswood, and Riverton. Since 2010, 14 more towns have applied and joined the Classic Towns program.

Classic Towns uses postcards, social media (like Facebook) shout-outs, and articles to promote its towns. In 2016 they more than tripled their total website visits. In DVRPC's Classic Towns of Greater Philadelphia 2016 STATUS REPORT, Haddon Heights received the fourth most "clicks"!

Don't Waste Those Precious Autumn Leaves

It's that time of year again when our yards become inundated with fallen leaves. Tired of all that raking or blowing leaves out of your lawn week after week? Well, you can save time, energy and work for yourself as well as be more environmentally-friendly by mulching them and using them in your yard and gardens. It also saves Haddon Heights time and money picking up and transporting your leaves to a composting facility. Remember, if you do rake or blow your leaves, do not put them into the street and keep them at least 10 feet from storm sewers. Also do not mix in any other yard waste and DO NOT PUT IN THE CLASSIC BLACK PLASTIC "YARD AND LEAF BAGS"!

Here are five ways to use leaves in your garden.

- 1. Compost Leaves Autumn leaves, especially those that have been shredded by a lawn mower, are dream additions to the compost pile. Leaves are a great source of "brown," high-carbon material for the compost. Simply alternate layers of shredded leaves with the regular green materials you'd add to your such compost pile as vegetable and fruit scraps, weeds, and plants that you pull out in your fall garden clean-up, and let it sit over the winter. Aerate or turn the pile when you think of it, and by planting time you'll have finished compost. You can also plan ahead to start new beds by laying down cardboard covered with mulched leaves in the fall, let it sit over the winter and plant the new bed in the spring.
- Make Leaf Mold Leaf mold is a fantastic garden amendment made from leaves with some garden soil or compost added. It should sit for about a year. After that time, it is great for vegetable and flower gardens as well as added to potting soil.
- Create Mulch First, shred your leaves with your lawn mower. This is the one time a year that bagging is a good thing. Bagging when you do a normal cutting of your grass wastes a great resource. The cut grass adds nutrients to the grass as well as keeping weeds at bay. Contrary to some beliefs, it does not cause thatch. But in the fall, use your bag to collect the mulched leaves. Many lawnmowers now have a specific recommendation for the height of the mower when you are mulching. The shredded leaves can be used in flower beds, vegetable gardens, and under trees and shrubs by applying a 2-3 inch layer of shredded leaves to the beds without touching the stems and trunks of the plants. The mulch retains moisture in the soil and limits weed seed germination all the while providing nutrients to the plants. Plan ahead if you have a composter and save a container or so of leaves over the winter since leaves are hard to come by in summer. Healthy compost demands both "browns" such as leaves and "greens" such as vegetable waste. Now is the time to be sure you have leaves for
- Mowing Should you decide you do not want to use the shredded leaves in your garden beds, still mulch the leaves



with your mower and let them stay on the grass-"Leaf them alone". The small pieces of leaves that remain will break down over the winter resulting in less lawn weeds next year. You will not have to rake a single leaf if you do it this way.

There you have it! Less work in the yard; more free time to enjoy the wonderful fall weather and the fun activities that it brings.

JEREMIAH WATSON MEETS THE JERSEY DEVIL!



Chatsworth blueberry farmer Jeremiah E. Watson, forty-nine, claims to have been STOPPED by the Jersey Devil while crossing the White Horse Pike this Wednesday past.

"I saw him plain as day," Me and my horse Purdner were on our way home from my blueberry field last Wednesday afternoon. It was raining pretty good so we decided to cut across the White Horse Pike and take the shortcut back to

Pardner sensed something and refused to take the shortent. Before I knew it, a loud shricking cry came from out of the sky. A second later a winged creature landed not fifty feet from us.

My horse spooked and took off, I stared at this thing for a few seconds and he stared back at me. Before I could move, he stomped his cloven hooves on the muddy road and began hissing. His green eyes were glowing and he looked pretty mad for us using his road.

From all the stories I heard growing up, I was sure I was looking at the JERSEY

After searing the daylights out of me, he flapped his wings then took off into the rainy afternoon sky.

It's a day I'll never forget all right!



When the Jersey Devil Terrorized Haddon Heights

The Jersey Devil, the most famous figure in Then, on Wednesday, January 20th, at 2am, the New Jersey folklore, visited Haddon Heights on January 20th, 1909. He circled in the air above the intersection of Station and East Atlantic Avenues above a trolley car full of people. (Back then, there were trolley tracks running along East Atlantic, carrying passengers from Camden to Clementon, with many stops in between.) The particular trolley car that attracted the Jersey Devil was traveling late at night, taking passengers home from Clementon Lake Park.

The earliest printed story of the Jersey Devil appeared in the Atlantic Monthly magazine in May 1859. The article explained that the Devil was a son born to "Mother Leeds" in 1735 in baby, upon delivery, immediately transformed into a beast with the head of a horse, wings of a bat, and a serpent's tail that "be-pommeled" his mother before flying out the window. First called the Leeds Devil, the creature supposedly devoured children, abused maidens, and mauled young men before a holy man's "enchantment" kept him away for 100 years. A century later, the awful monster reappeared, howling and screaming in the dark Pine Barrens. The article concluded that few Jerseymen will "brave the supernatural terrors of the gloomy forest at night...."

The strange activities of 1909 occurred over a

one-week period starting on January 16th. On the first day, both a policeman and the postmaster in Bristol PA saw a flying creature that then left tracks in Burlington, and was subsequently seen at a shipyard in Gloucester City. Over the next few days, the Devil in Collingswood, seen Moorestown, and Riverside.

trolley stopped in Haddon Heights to discharge a passenger, and the Jersey Devil circled the car menacingly, with the passengers' faces pressed to the glass windows as he soared away. The paper reported that Lewis Boeger of Haddon Heights described the creature he saw as resembling a hideous "kangaroo with large wings.... about 4 feet high."

After terrorizing the trolley, the Jersey Devil was seen throughout the Philadelphia/South Jersey region over the next two days. But then, the creature disappeared. The local Retrospect reported in its February 5th edition that the Collingswood Holly Club had captured the Burlington Township on a stormy night. The Devil and served him for dinner the previous Thursday, while the "Ninth and Arch Street Dime Museum" in Philadelphia claimed to have him stuffed and on display for the paying public to see. A leading expert on crytozoology (mystical beasts) theorized that the entire week of terror in 1909 was the work of one Norman Jeffries, Press Agent for the same Philadelphia museum, who planted stories of the Devil and his outrageous behavior in the local media in advance of their Jersey Devil exhibit.

> But we'll never know for sure. Whether in the depths of the Pine Barrens, or just in our collective imagination, the Jersey Devil lives on.

Sustainable Haddon Heights

Are You Sustainable and "Green" When You Eat at a Restaurant?

We all love to eat out. We try very hard in our everyday home life to be "green" and sustainable but do we carry it to the restaurants we visit? Probably not. There are so many ways we can still support our environment in a restaurant by small things we can do or bring with us. There is so much waste and inefficiency in many local restaurants that it is alarming from huge portions that go back to the kitchen uneaten to piles of napkins and plastic straws. Certainly there are environmentally-friendly restaurants in our area and deserve your patronage but what can you do about the other ones?

1. Water should be served only on request. Generally, the minute you sit down, you are served not only a glass of water but it contains a plastic straw. If you visit the same restaurant frequently, you probably are aware of their routine. If you have the chance to stop the delivery to your table of an unwanted glass of water, do so. Even if you want the water, decline the plastic straw. Not only is most of the water served wasted by only partially being consumed but the glasses waste more water since they must go through the dishwasher whether you touched them or not wasting more energy. If you do want water, opt for tap water. Plastic water bottles use much more energy

as well as the raw materials used in bottling and transportation.

2. Straws are a disaster to the environment. Over 8 million tons of plastic enters the oceans every year. In the United States, 500 million straws are used every single day. The average straw is used for 20 minutes before we toss them "away". These types of plastic never completely biodegrades and is turning our oceans into plastic soup. STRAWS CANNOT BE RECYCLED.

It is doubtful that most of us ever use straws at home but feel compelled to use them in restaurants. Okay, for items like a smoothie or milkshake, you really need a straw so invest in either a stainless steel one that can go in the dishwasher when you get home or bring a paper straw with you, thus avoiding the plastic altogether. Having iced tea and need to add a sweetener? Use a metal spoon to stir it.

• Use recycled or recyclable to-go containers instead of Styrofoam. Bring your own container from home if you think you will be bringing leftovers home. Decline all Styrofoam from togo containers to coffee cups. Styrofoam lasts forever in landfills. Granted, in Camden County most trash goes to the incinerator and not landfills but occasionally, the incinerators need maintenance or repair so you just


know where your trash will wind Styrofoam up. is composed of Benzene and Styrene, both of which are known human carcinogens. The production of Styrofoam is energy intensive

creating large amounts of greenhouse gases. Microwaving Styrofoam releases toxic chemicals. Styrofoam takes at least 500 years to decompose and is the primary cause of urban litter, is the main pollutant of oceans, bays and other US waterways and causes choking and starvation in wildlife. Many countries and US cities have banned Styrofoam including:

- New York City (and several other cities in New York)
- Takoma Park, MD
- Seattle, Washington
- Washington DC
- Miami Beach, FL
- Freeport, Maine • Portland, Maine
- Nantucket (City & County), Massachusetts
- Minneapolis, Minnesota
- Portland, Oregon (and several other Oregon cities)
- Los Angeles County and San Francisco, California (and many other cities and counties in CA)



3. These are only three ways that you easily can maintain your "green" way of life. But that is not enough. If you truly care about the environment, use this as a way to not only educate the wait staff but the manager. Especially in family-owned restaurants, take a minute to either speak to the owner or send an email educating them in a few ways to be a "greener" restaurant. What you may not be thinking about it that it can actually save them money. The money saved by not automatically serving water with a straw, for example, may save them enough money to purchase environmentally-friendly to-go packaging instead of Styrofoam. Spend a few minutes getting the word out. Mother Earth thanks you.




