Mayor's Message

Dear Neighbors:

Hopefully the parade of nor'easters has finally ended!

Although the bad weather affected our fields, both the Borough and the volunteers from Haddon Heights Youth Athletics (HHYA) have been working hard to get ready for another baseball and softball season. Opening day is scheduled for Saturday, April 14th. All teams will gather at the corner of W. Atlantic and Station Avenue (Carole's Candy) at 8:40 am for a Parade which will proceed down W. Atlantic Avenue to the ball fields. The Opening Day Ceremony will follow. I look forward to this every year and I know our children do too. I'll try to throw a strike with the first pitch! I want to thank everyone who work so hard to provide a top notch athletics program to our children – for generations, thousands of kids have enjoyed playing baseball and softball through HHYA.

Speaking of the nice weather, before we know it, it will be time for our Summer Rec program. This program,

under the management of Executive Director (and former Councilwoman who still volunteers so much of her time) Kathy Lange, has only a few spots left. Finally, I wanted to take a moment to recognize the hard work done by our Planning Board. I have had the honor of serving on that board for a number of years. The Board's work is often misunderstood. Land use law in New Jersey is incredibly complex and is governed by both state law and our local ordinances. What is, and is not, permitted is often a product of how those laws work together. The Board doesn't write the laws – instead, they sit often like judges in court, and have to apply the law according to certain criteria. Sometimes, the hearings can get contentious, and the Board has to make tough decisions with passionate



residents on both sides. I know our Board works very hard to decide cases according to the law, without prejudice or passion. I appreciate the hard work and difficult decisions they often have to make.

As I've mentioned before, it is a great honor and privilege for me to serve as your Mayor. My job is to serve our residents. If there is anything I can do to assist you, please don't hesitate to call, e-mail or stop by during my office hours listed on the front page of this HEIGHTS REPORT.

An informational mailing, including emergency contact forms and other pertinent details will be sent to all families who are attending around the beginning of May.

Counselor Employment Opportunity

The Haddon Heights Summer Recreation Program seeks teen counselors for the 2018 season.

Counselors work with Adult Directors to supervise and interact with boys and girls aged 5 thru grade 6. Counselors take part in all program activities, active play, outdoor games, crafts, science demos, nature walks etc. Counselors must be at least 16 years of age by June 1, 2018 and have completed at least sophomore year of high school in June. The Summer Rec work schedule is Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 8 am until noon from Tuesday, June 26 to Thursday, July 26. Counselors should be available all 15 days of the program. Pay is NJ minimum wage (\$8.60 an hour) and all previous counselors must reapply for a position. As a Borough sponsored activity, preference will be given to Haddon Heights residents. To be eligible for an interview, the required information (hard copy) must be delivered or mailed to Haddon Heights Borough Hall, 625 Station Ave. Haddon Heights, NJ 08035 Attention Sum Rec, by Wednesday, April 11th, 4 pm. There is no "application form"; your resume and all required documents are your application. Because this is a position of responsibility, only applicants with a complete application will be considered for an employment interview. We will acknowledge applications by May 1 and schedule interviews later that month. Training sessions for those hired will take place in June.

- Resume must include name, complete home address, a parent/guardian cell number, applicant's cell phone, applicant's email address, complete date of birth, (month, date and year), name of your High School and current Grade in school. Resume should also include school related and outside activities, any previous work or volunteer experience and hobbies, special interests, certifications or training
- Most Current school report card (3rd quarter) including grades, attendance and lateness. Please make sure that your school name appears on the report card
- Letters of recommendation from (2) current teachers with their contact info plus a third letter of recommendation from a non-related adult of your choice

2018 Pet Licensing

Renewal forms for the cat and dog licenses have been mailed and are now due. The cost for a spayed/neutered cat or dog is still just \$9.00. The cost for a non-spayed/non-neutered cat or dog is \$12.00. To avoid the \$10.00 late fee, license must be issued on or before JUNE 30, 2018.

Please note that in order to obtain a license & tag you must provide the Borough with current vaccination information from your veterinarian. Also for the borough to be able to issue the license your pet's rabies vaccination **must not expire before November 1st, 2018**. This is a state regulation, if you have questions about the regulation you can find more information about it on the State of NJ's website.

If your pet(s) are in need of getting an updated rabies vaccine, we are again offering a free rabies clinic at the end of April (see information below). If you have questions about the timing of your pets rabies vacation, we recommend calling your vet.

Delaware & Susquehanna Model Railroad Club



If you are one of the followers of our model railroad, have you ever wondered how we get ideas for the modules or figure out how to accurately model the equipment that you see running on the

layout? There are plenty of books on trains available, but the better way to get ideas is to visit actual railroads or railroad museums. Most of the prototype railroads we model no longer exist, so museums are the best way to see the preserved equipment. With the return of good weather, it is time to get out of the station and visit some of these. We are fortunate that there are three museums located within an easy drive. The closest is the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania, located in Strasburg, Pennsylvania. A bonus here is that the museum is collocated with the Strasburg Railroad. You could both visit the museum and take a short train ride in one location. The Baltimore and Ohio Museum has both exhibits and offers a short train ride as well. Baltimore is only two hours away. A third opportunity is the Reading Company Historical Society museum located in Hamburg, Pennsylvania. There are also some interesting day trips such as the Harrisburg or Reading areas where there are still railroads operating on the historic rights of way. For details on any of these sites, it is best to check the respective websites for operating hours and special events. You can also search on the internet for opportunities to visit these locations with suggestions for dining at preserved stations and other attractions. Spring is definitely a good time to see more trains!

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Siding Issues in Haddon Heights

In a historic district, the goal is to preserve/restore/replace the original building materials of all of the “contributing” buildings in the district. Many of the 100 year old buildings in our historic districts had already been covered with “fake” siding before they became part of a historic district.

In the 1920’s asphalt building siding (“insulbrick”) became a popular building renovation alternative to painting weathered or rotted wood clapboard or wood shingles. Asphalt building siding was composed of asphalt shingle-like material, colored mineral granules bonded to a wood product base with asphalt, sometimes producing faux red, brown or yellow brick. In the 1920’s to the 50’s it was used both for low-cost housing and covering deteriorated exterior walls of older homes. In the 1950’s this was followed by asbestos siding made from adding asbestos to Portland cement and then pressing this into shingles that came in a wide variety of sizes and textures. Next came aluminum siding, then vinyl, and finally fiber-cement siding (“HardiPlank”).

Around town, owners have removed the insulbrick/vinyl/aluminum siding from their old houses and restored the original clapboard/shingles. In the historic districts, a few owners have been permitted to replace extensively rotted clapboard with HardiPlank. Several have been permitted to cover the insulbrick with vinyl “clapboard” siding. In the historic districts, an addition to a building may always be built using vinyl or cementitious siding as its original siding. But an original wooden clapboard or shingle house has a majesty that fake siding can’t imitate.

Congratulations to the homeowners both within and without the historic districts who have retained their original building materials. All property owners in a historic district must appear before the HPC before they do anything to the exterior of their building, except paint. Paint/paint colors are not regulated by our Historic District Ordinance. The Historic Preservation Commission meets the last Thursday of each month and is available for consultation about your old house, whether or not it is in a historic district.

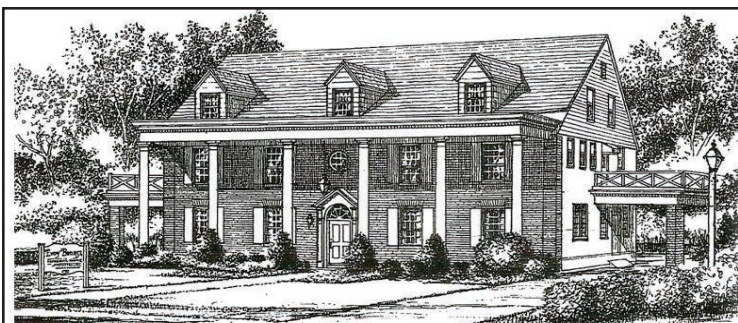

Spring Garden Clean-up with Pollinators in Mind



After a fairly warm but very wet winter, most residents do not want to wait when it comes to cleaning up their properties and gardens. But that may not be the very best idea for encouraging the pollinators that we so need. Knowing that the days and jobs related to the garden increase as the warm weather is upon us, the "get er done" mentality is not the best.

Many beneficial insects spend their winters either as adults or pupae in hollow plant stems. On warm days, they may even wake up. Cutting down plant stems too early in the season may not allow them to emerge. Rule of thumb is to wait until daytime temperatures stay above 50 degrees. If you absolutely just can't wait that long, toss the cut perennial and woody plant stems onto the compost pile very loosely. Another option would be to bundle a few cut stems with twine and hang them on a fence or lean against a tree to give them time to emerge.

Do a careful leaf clean up especially in your perennial beds. Many, many beneficial insects such as ladybugs spend the winter in leaf litter as adults and other do as eggs or pupae. Several varieties of butterflies and moths spend the winter in leaf litter. Cocoons may look like a crinkled brown leaf. As you rake, keep an eye out for these insects and try not to disturb them.

Don't mulch yet! Covering the ground with a layer of mulch too early in the spring may block their emergence. Hold out until the soil dries out a little and the weather warms.

If you must prune woody perennials or shrubs, keep a sharp eye out for cocoon and chrysalises. Allow any branches with a cocoon or chrysalis present to stay intact. You can always cut them back later in the season.

Being patient this spring can bring many rewards to your yard and help the pollinators. *(adapted from an article in Savvy Gardening)*

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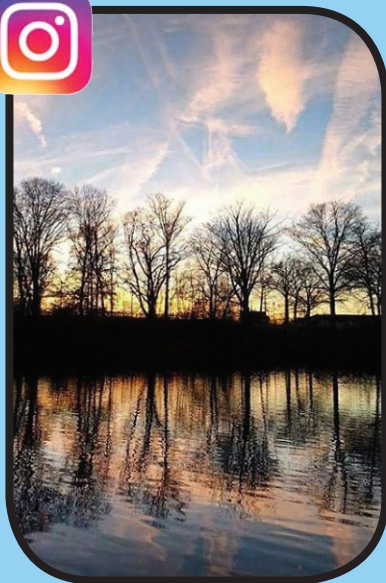

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Please Don't Buy Baby Chicks at Easter

Even with having the very successful backyard chicken pilot in Haddon Heights, which is entering its second year, other parents may still be enticed to buy baby chicks at Easter. First of all, most retail gardening and feed stores must sell you a minimum of six chicks to prevent impulse buying. Without knowledge of how to raise chicks and the realization that they grow up and need a predator-proof coop and run, they would still be illegal in Haddon Heights unless the family met the qualifications of the backyard chicken pilot and obtained a license. A maximum of four hens are allowed and no roosters. While the stores claim to have a 90% success rate of sexing the chicks so you do not get a rooster, the odds are you will. The 90% is from all the sexing they do, thousands if not more chicks, and not just the ones you bring home. Roosters are the loud ones and are not necessary to have eggs for breakfast but only if breeding more chickens. It is very difficult to find a home for roosters.

Buying Easter Pets is a bad idea

Ducklings, bunnies, & chicks are cute and cheap at Easter.

Avoid the temptation unless you can provide 10 years of care.



In Haddon Heights, there are also some very reasonable regulations about setbacks and location of the coop (the chicken house) and the run (an enclosed, large cage which must be predator-proof where the hens spend most of their day). The Backyard Chicken Advisory board does a home visit to insure that the yard qualifies as well as a follow-up visit to be sure the coop meets criteria for the health of the hens as well as conforming to guidelines. The other requirement is the mandatory attendance at a 2 hour class to learn the basics of raising backyard hens. After completing the class, a certificate of attendance is issued which would be submitted to the borough along with a signed application by the resident as well as a representative of the Backyard Chicken Advisory Board and the license fee.



At this point, there are several openings in the backyard chicken pilot. Contact the municipal clerk to receive a copy of the pilot regulations. For more information, contact Brian Kovacs at bjkovacs@gmail.com. The pilot members will also be having a presence at the farmers' markets on selected dates. 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Stormwater Pollution

Stormwater pollution is caused by runoff water when it rains that travels into the creeks, streams, or rivers that get polluted. When it rains, some of the rainwater soaks into the ground and part of the water flows over the ground and directly into the creeks, streams, or rivers. This water that runs off into the river is called runoff, and this stormwater gets polluted. Pollution is anything that harms natural resources, which in this case, is water. Sometimes the pollution is something you can see. Like trash floating on the top of the water. Other times, you can't see the pollution at all, like when motor oil from a car washes into a nearby creek and pollutes the water in which we drink and swim in.

Many things we do and that happen around us every day can cause polluted runoff. Here are a few examples: Washing the car - when you wash the car, all of the soap, scum. And oily grit run down into the storm drain. A storm drain on your street and in your neighborhood carries rainwater away from your area and directly into streams and rivers near you. If you live in the country, water from your yard may go into a ditch and then flow to streams and rivers. If you live along the coast, it may go straight into the ocean. The runoff water is not cleaned or treated along the way, and anything that goes into the storm drain or ditch goes into the water. Litter - when people throw trash on the ground, it ends up into the creeks, rivers, and lakes. This litter harms water quality and wildlife. An example of a cigarette butt can take 25 years to break down. Lawn Care - fertilizer is used on lawns to help them grow. When people use more fertilizer than their lawns need, or if they fertilize just before it rains, a lot of the chemical ends up in the runoff and not their lawn. When this happens, it runs down the storm drain and into the river. Fertilizer helps things grow, but when it gets into the water, it helps algae grow. Algae blooms can cause major problems in waterways because they use up oxygen needed by other river critters. Poop - really, let's talk about poop. Example, does your family own a dog? Dog waste that is not picked up and left behind also makes its way into the water. Dog waste contains bacteria that can harm people. These bacteria end up in the water that we drink when people don't pick up after their dogs. So, you can see many causes of stormwater

pollution are activities that people do every day. Many people do not even know that what they do is polluting the water.

What can you do to help? A pollution permit or a treatment plant can't solve stormwater pollution. Stormwater runoff comes from small, individual sources in all parts of the watershed. It is a problem that could be changed by stopping small individual activities that cause pollution and result in large scale pollution. Here are some examples of minimizing stormwater problems: 1) maintain your car or truck never dump anything down a storm drain. Always recycle used oil, antifreeze and other fluids. Fix oil leaks in your vehicle. 2) Wash your car at a commercial car wash than in the street or driveway. 3) Cut down on fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides. If you use chemicals, follow directions and use them sparingly. Don't fertilize before a rain storm. Consider using organic fertilizer. Compost or mulch lawn clippings and preserve existing trees or plant new ones- trees hold rainfall and help manage stormwater. 4) If you are on a septic system, maintain the system. Septic systems require regular inspections, maintenance and pumping, or they will fail, cost a lot of money to fix and could pollute nearby lakes and streams. Have a professional inspector check your system regularly and have it pumped out when needed. 5) Pick up after your pets and keep animals out of streams. Scoop your dog's poop and properly dispose of it. Also, make sure fences and other structures are keeping cows, horses, and other animals out of the streams. Compost manure in a designated area so that it doesn't wash off into nearby waterways.

Support your local storm or surface water program. Programs to maintain a community's stormwater system, prevent flooding and protect natural resources may cost money in the short run but save money for damages to public and private property in the long term. Take advantages of opportunities to educate yourself and your family about your local watershed. You can search the internet for more information on stormwater, runoff, rain gardens, low impact development, etc. You can also visit U.S. Environmental Protection Agency: cfpub1.epa.gov/npdes/home.cfm?program_id=6

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Sleepy Sector. Solid Returns. An Overview of the Self Storage Industry

Self storage has never been a glitzy option for investors looking to diversify their portfolio. The asset class doesn't generate anywhere near the excitement of a high rise condominium development in Miami or an office building in Manhattan. Investors willing to sacrifice the glamour of riskier opportunities can be well compensated for investing in self storage. This sector offers portfolios insulation from economic downturns as the business model features high profit margins and thrives on life events.

Self storage as an asset class has weathered multiple economic cycles while demonstrating recession resistant traits. The resilience of this asset class was displayed in 2008 when self storage was the only REIT sector to deliver a positive return. The demand for storage is driven by life disruptions as well as the normal stages in family life, such as birth, death, marriage, divorce, retirement, relocation, college enrollment, and military enlistment. Demand is strong during times of both economic expansion and contraction. Families need self storage during boom times as they move out of apartments into their first home or upsize into a larger home. Storage is a valued option when relocating for employment or transitioning into a retirement community. Former homeowners utilized facilities during the Great Recession to protect their belongings and heirlooms as they downsized into smaller rental units. On the commercial side, businesses lacking space use storage for records, inventory, tools, materials, and furniture. Similar to the residential customer, businesses rent storage during both strong and weak economic periods. The last recession pushed many small businesses out of warehouses and these firms found self storage to be an affordable alternative to maintaining larger, costlier spaces.

The resiliency of self storage can also be attributed to the low overhead required to run facilities as they are not nearly as management intensive as other types of real estate. Facilities are typically run by one or two employees and repairs are minimal when compared with the wear and tear that an apartment complex

endures. Utility expenses are nominal as water usage is low and lights are controlled by sensors. The low overhead means higher profit margins and lower delinquency rates than other real estate asset classes with breakeven occupancy rates being approximately 20% lower than multifamily communities. Unlike apartments, facilities can be properly repositioned without investing millions of dollars in capital expenditures. The reduced construction budget affords operators the opportunity to deliver high cash on cash returns to investors without using excessive levels of debt. Projects featuring low leverage and high yields are difficult to come by in today's investment environment but are available in the self storage industry.

Depending on the market, there could be serious barriers to entry for new self storage facilities. The proposal to build a self storage facility often provokes the ire of the town planning board, council, and other local stakeholders due to facilities typically being viewed as having a low tax base and providing few jobs. Historically, facilities have at best been perceived as tacky and at worst assumed to be a haven for crime. The only thing guaranteed about the approval process is that the developer will face a slew of "not in my backyard" excuses for why self storage will not be built inside city limits. The stigma surrounding self storage facilities combined with a lack of available land has pushed development towards increasingly attractive but less accessible multistory interior facilities that lack drive up units. These development challenges mean there is significant value in owning existing, well located self storage assets.

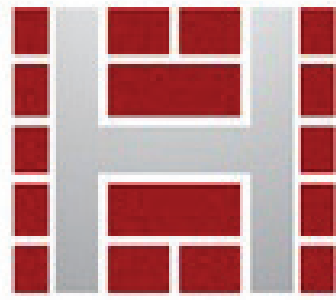
Renewal rates in the storage industry can often be increased by a higher percentage than other sectors.

The opportunity cost for a customer to take a day off work to rent a truck so they can move their belongings to a competing property is often too great to justify relative to the increased rent. A customer who is paying \$150 per month for a 10 x 10 unit is willing to accept a 5% increase because the actual monthly dollar increase is only \$7.50. If that same customer

received a 5% increase on their \$1,500 per month apartment they would be facing an additional \$75 per month which could be enough to push the resident to relocate to a neighboring community. While apartment owners might only be able to increase rents 2% or 3% each year without substantially improving the unit interiors or common areas, a self storage facility could potentially increase rents 5% or more because the actual dollar amount is often considered nominal and accepted by the customer. These rent hikes combined with reduced expenses increase the facility's net operating income which in turn creates the potential for millions of dollars in value that can be harvested and returned to investors by either refinancing or selling the asset.

The sector remains highly fragmented with REIT's and regional operators controlling just over a quarter of the nation's facilities while the rest of the market is still controlled by "mom & pop" owners. Many acquisition opportunities prove to be attractive value added investments as they are currently mismanaged and operated by less technologically savvy ownership groups.
