WATER FEATURES*

STREAMS

- · Kings Run is the stream that runs from the Cannons past the former Glover Fulling Mill to Kings Hwy.
- · Little Timber Creek is a separate stream within the Big Timber Creek watershed that starts in Tavistock, runs partly underground in pipes, emerges to become the boundary between Haddon Heights and Barrington and between Bellmawr and Mt. Ephraim, before joining the Big Timber Creek and emptying into the Delaware River between Gloucester City and Brooklawn.
- · South Branch of Newton Creek begins in Haddon Lake Park in Haddon Heights and flows northwest toward Gloucester City.

WATERSHEDS

- Big Timber Creek Watershed drains an area of 63 square miles in Camden and Gloucester Counties, including 48% of Haddon Heights.
- Newton Creek Watershed is the smallest watershed entirely within Camden County, draining an area of only 13.6 square miles, including 52% of Haddon Heights.

FIELD INFORMATION*

- · Bank Field—informally named after a bank previously located at White Horse Pike & E High St.
- Barr Complex—named after John J. Barr, past president of American Water Works Co. and instrumental in providing the land and labor to construct the athletic fields named in his honor. Composed of Edward F. Fitzgerald Memorial Field (closest to I-295), Majors Field and Minors Field (closest to Lippincott Lane).
- · Joseph A. Cervino Field—HHHS athlete and strong supporter of HH youth athletics, particularly baseball. Former DPW clerk.
- Norman F. Hoff Playground & Park—HHHS Teacher, Coach, Athletic Director. Promoted and directed HH youth activities, games and crafts programs from 1957-1979.
- · Joseph I. McCullough Complex at Devon Ave- Mayor from 1972-1980, Council-Planning-Zoning Board member, Library Trustee. Strong advocate to repurpose this land for recreation.
