Leaf collection is around the corner

Fall is just around the corner. As the leaves start changing that means they will soon start falling. Leaf collection will begin on October and run through December.

PLEASE ADHERE TO THE FOLLOWING GUIDELINES:

- Lawn Service Contractors MUST remove leaves from your property.
- Rake your leaves to the CURB. Please DO NOT place leaves in the street. Leaf piles in the street cause flooding and drainage problems during rainstorms. DO NOT place leaves closer than 10 feet from any storm sewer inlet. DO NOT park cars in front or on top of leaf piles, our trucks will not be able to pick up those leaves that are blocked.
- DO NOT mix leaves and brush. Your can(s) will NOT be collected if it is mixed. When the trucks are taken to be dumped the dump can and will refuse our trucks if there is anything mixed in that is not allowed to be. We thank you in advance for your cooperation.

The last day for Grass collection will be on October 28th, 2019.

The last day for Brush collection:

East side (10th Ave. to Haddonfield) will be Thursday October 24th.

West side (10th Ave. to the Black Horse Pike) will be Thursday October 31st.

Tax Assessor's Office

New Jersey Law requires the Tax Assessor's office to keep all property assessments current. The Assessor's inspector may visit your property if the property owner or their contractor obtained a building permit to build a new building, or update, improve, expand, remodel, redecorate, rehab and/or demolish an existing building located in Haddon Heights. Please cooperate with the Assessor's inspector who will perform an interior and exterior examination of your home or business, and request information to confirm the type of work done, or to be done, the cost of the project, and the date the job was, or is to be completed. This inspection is in addition to any inspection(s) required by the Haddon Heights Building Inspection Department.

The inspector will visit your property unannounced in the day, early evening, or on a Saturday. This method of inspection is very cost effective and I greatly appreciate your help allowing the inspector to collect the data required. The inspectors who work for the Tax Assessor's office are Judith Shoemaker (Judi), Jeffery Scott Pierson (Scott), and myself. Each inspector will wear an official Haddon Heights Borough ID Badge.

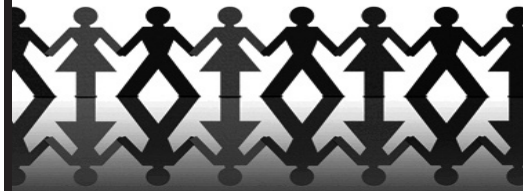

Estate Plans Can Help You Answer Questions About the Future

The word “estate” conjures images of great wealth, which may be one of the reasons so many people don’t develop estate plans – after all, they’re not rich, so why make the effort? In reality, though, if you have a family, you can probably benefit from estate planning, whatever your asset level. And you may well find that a comprehensive estate plan can help you answer some questions you may find unsettling – or even worrisome.

Here are a few of these questions:

What will happen to my children? With luck, you (and your co-parent, if you have one) will be alive and well at least until your children reach the age of majority (either 18 or 21, depending on where you live). During probate, your relatives and creditors can gain access to your records, and possibly even challenge your will. But with proper planning, you can maintain your privacy. As one possible element of an estate plan, a living trust allows your property to avoid probate and pass quickly to the beneficiaries you’ve named.

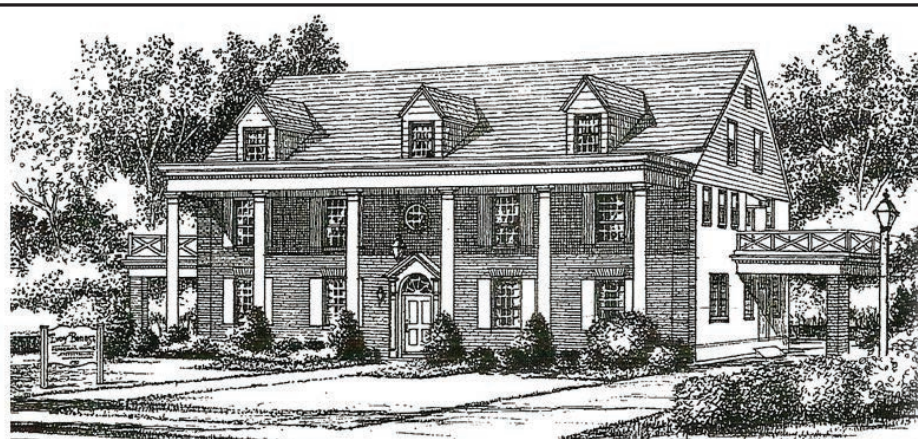
Who will oversee my finances and my living situation if I become incapacitated? You can build various forms of protection into your estate planning, such as a durable power of attorney, which allows you to designate someone to manage your financial affairs if you become physically or mentally incapacitated. You could also create a medical power of attorney, which allows someone to handle health care decisions on your behalf if you become unable to do so yourself.

Will I shortchange my family if I leave significant assets to charities? Unless you have unlimited resources, you’ll have to make some choices about charitable gifts and money for your family. But as part of your estate plans, you do have some appealing options. For example, you could establish a charitable lead trust, which provides financial support to your chosen charities for a period of time, with the remaining assets eventually going to your family members. A charitable remainder trust, by contrast, can provide a stream of income for your family members for the term of the trust, before the remaining assets are transferred to one or more charitable organizations.

As you can see, careful estate planning can help you answer many of the questions that may be worrying you. Be aware, though, that certain aspects of estate planning, especially those related to living trusts and charitable trusts, can be complex, so you should consult your estate-planning attorney or qualified tax advisor about your situation. But once you’ve got your plans in place, you should be able to face the future with greater clarity and confidence.

Historic Districting in Haddon Heights

In 1976 for the Bicentennial, the White Horse Pike and Station Avenue were declared historic districts, along with the colonial era houses as historic sites. In 1984 the Planning Board began enforcing the Historic Preservation Ordinance after demolition threatened many houses on the White Horse Pike. A town wide study by the State was done and recommended buffeting the Pike with Fourth Avenue and East Atlantic to protect those streets from “encroachment.” It worked. About 10 years later, to protect vacant lot from inappropriate development, the neighbors on the unit block of First Avenue got together, documented their houses and asked the Borough to declare them a historic district and it did.

Historic districts are neighborhoods where individually the houses might not be worthy of protection but collectively tell a story of time and place. The White Horse Pike Historic District tells the story of the architectural development of the town from the late 1890’s, from Victorian, Italianate, Shingle, to Colonial Revival, American Foursquare, to the Bungalows of the 1920’s. Station Avenue Historic District does the same with retail and office buildings. Each individual property need not be exceptional in its own right to merit designation but rather each building’s relationship – sometimes obvious, sometimes subtle – to a greater whole is considered. In theory, a local historic district protects the neighborhood against loss of character. Thematic districts can include “individual elements separated geographically but linked by association, i.e. the old brick sidewalks, iron fences, old garages and carriage houses that are remnants of early Haddon Heights and scattered around the town.”

When the original architectural survey was done in 1985, the study recommended the original core of the town – First Avenue to Tenth Avenue be part of a historic district. A local historic district protects a street or neighborhood against demolition and invasive development or alteration by providing a measure of Planning Board review. An updated survey was done in 2013 and is available at the Borough Hall and Library for your review, recommending additional districts and “stand-alone” nominations.

Perhaps you and your neighbors feel you have a neighbor whose houses represent a particular time in Haddon Heights development – the American Foursquares of the 1910’s, the bungalows of the 1920’s, the Cape Cods of the 1950’s. If so, talk among yourselves and bring your interests to the Historic Preservation Commission which meets the last Thursday of the month in the Mayor’s Office.

Safe Routes to School

Sunday May 5th the Safe Routes to School group helped organize the first Haddon Heights Bike Rodeo at the Haddon Heights Farmer's Market. Helmet fittings, giveaways and educational materials were available from the Brain Alliance of NJ and Cross County Connections. Over 50 local children braved the rain to receive a free helmet as part of the event. The following



week was National Bike or Walk to School Week. Each of our public elementary schools participated the week of May 6th. Thursday September 6th, plan to walk off those first day jitters on the First Day of School!

Have you ever walked down a sidewalk and had to walk into a yard because of overgrown bushes? Our kids are headed back to school. Please take a minute to look at your sidewalk. Generally, the sidewalk should be 5' wide and flat (sidewalk bumps less than 2"), brush should be cleared from the sidewalk (ideally 1' outside the edge)

and there should be 7' of vertical clearance, so even someone tall doesn't hit a branch.

A Safe Routes to School Program was established with representatives from the local public elementary schools teamed with Town Council, the Board of Education and Cross County Connections (CCC) Transportation Management Association. CCC went on to compile a School Travel Plan for us. A School Travel Plan is a document that helps to identify student walking and bicycling travel corridors and recommends infrastructure improvements to make the travel corridors safer for students. The School Travel Plan includes a section to summarize existing conditions, identify general recommendations and identify specific student travel corridor recommendations surrounding each public elementary school. In addition to infrastructure related improvements, there is also a section on Non-Infrastructure Recommendations that focus on things like education, encouragement and enforcement. The Haddon Heights School Travel Plan is available on the town's NEW website in the News Section.

Mr. Celli, Special Education Teacher, and Ms. Kahlbom, Speech Therapist, created the PCAST (Person Centered Approaches in School and Transition) curriculum and elective class after being trained in formal Person Centered Practices through The Rutgers Boggs Center and NJDOE. They are the first two educators in the New Jersey area to create such a class. The elective class focuses on identifying student strengths and supports needed to be successful in both academic and personal life. Through self reflection, facilitated conversations and introspective lessons, these approaches encourage students to be able to increase meaningful contribution in the IEP process, promote informed decision making and support intentional, thoughtful, transition planning. The class also addresses interview skills, public speaking and resume writing; all key points in fostering transition into post secondary life, whether it be college, employment, certification or apprenticeship.

As the end of the year approached and as a culmination of all their hard work, the students gave their final presentations. The presentations focused mostly on their vision for the future, career/college exploration and personal strengths. The students did a wonderful job presenting their projects to an impressive audience which included the Assistant Commissioner of Education, Ms. Carolyn Marano, NJDOE Office of Special Education PCAST project leader, Mr. Robert Haugh, Rutgers Boggs Center Somerlee Monaghan and Margaret Gilbride, as well as our administrative team. 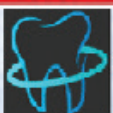
Sometimes the affects of trauma cannot be noticed right away as it takes a few years for traumatic changes to happen inside the teeth.

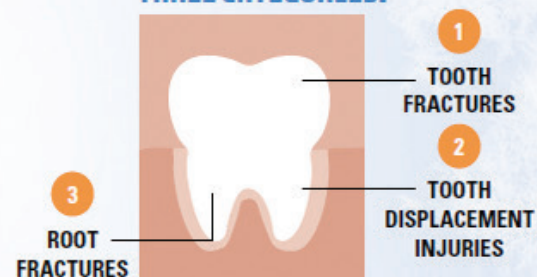

Me: Oh, but there is! We have a sign when you walk in that says "Welcome: all colors all sexes, all orientations, all religions all cultures, all ages, all sizes, all individuals. Love lives here!"

Other: Okay. I get that there is a sign - But you can't really mean that! How could you get anything done without constant argument?

Me: You know... that is a little hard to explain. Perhaps the simplest way to say it is that we try to live the lessons we teach kids in our Peace Camp. Everyone has value. We can't solve problems or listen to each other unless we really listen to others. It's basic stuff really, but it is sort of our "Rule of Life".

I guess you're not convinced ... you'll have to just come check it out. Anytime...

About a year ago, St. Mary's committed to becoming a Center for Justice and Peace, open to all who share that concern. If you have any abiding concerns about the future of our world, you'll understand what we are trying to do.



We are getting ready to run our second Peace Camp for children entering 1st through 6th grades. This year we are running the program for 2 weeks (August 12 – 16 and 19 – 23), at a cost of \$50 per week per child. Need-based scholarships are available so please do not hesitate to call if your child would benefit from crafts, games, activities, music, yoga, and more! Our activities are designed to teach children group



problem-solving, listening skills, helpful responses to conflict, and more. Regular hours are 9 a.m. – 1 p.m., but before-camp and after-camp care is available at \$5/hour/child. If you have not registered yet... call the office asap: (856) 547 – 3240. It's going to be great!

For those of us who no longer qualify as "kids" ... we are venturing into a world we call "Theology on Tap" – usually the second Tuesday of every month. Why?? Well because we know that some of the deepest conversations happen far outside the church doors! Theology on Tap is a chance to sit down in a comfy place, with your preferred refreshment, to consider life – or whatever else is on your mind. Join us at the Tap Room, 427 Crystal Lake Ave., on Tuesday, August 13th, 7 p.m. Make some friends (or bring some along), relax, and share as much as you like. All are welcome!

And something else we've turned things a bit upside down! We don't think we should wait for people to come check us out in church... The way we look at it, Jesus never set foot in a church and – though he went to synagogue, he certainly didn't spend all his time there. Following his example, we want to meet our neighbors. So, you (YES, YOU!!) are invited to our first ever picnic & crab fest! This will be an all-are-welcome celebration of food, neighbors, and music on our lawn (Green Street and Atlantic Avenue). Come eat, enjoy some music and conversation, and make friends! Saturday, August 10th. (If you want to bring something to share, you are welcome to do that, though it isn't necessary.)

In another community "let's get-to-know-each-other" event, St. Mary's invites you to join us on a two-hour cruise on the Delaware River aboard the North Wind Schooner, on Friday, August 23rd. The North Wind is operated by Gloucester city Sail, a non-profit. Cost is \$35, and you can sign up at www.northwindsail.org. If you are going, please call the office and let us know, so we can find you in the course of the evening!

St. Mary's has been engaged in discussions and programs on issues of racial justice. Over the last few months we visited the Peter Mott house in Lawnside (an historic stop on the Underground Railroad) and the Underground Railroad Museum in Burlington. We cannot understand the history of racism in the U.S. unless we are intentional. Two events sponsored by our Justice & Peace Center will be of interest to others who share this concern: On September 7th, we are sponsoring a trip to the National Museum of African American History and Culture, in Washington, D.C. Bus spots are limited and will cost about \$55. Please call the office to inquire about being part of this important venture.

And – to all who share our awareness that we all need a deeper understanding of our country's history of racism – we are extending an invitation to join us for film- and reading-based conversations about race and racism. Our Sacred Ground Circles of Dialogue will be grounded in online documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories and their intersection with European American histories, and

weaving in threads of family stories economic class, and political and regional identity. These will be rich conversations! Dates are not yet confirmed, but this 10-part conversation series will begin in September. Recycling: Good News, Bad News

The good news is we are recycling more!

Single-stream curbside recycling has been a big success. Over 40% of municipal waste collected is recycled, closer to the 50% to 60% goal.

The bad news?

In the past municipalities were paid for recycling materials. Now municipalities are paying, since supply exceeds demand, and are being fined for contamination!

Since recycling is still mandatory, here's what you can do to help.

Reduce both the amount of trash and recycling you generate. For example, instead of buying individual servings of an item (even if they are recyclable), buy a larger size and repack into smaller, reusable containers. Instead of using plastic produce bags, single-use plastic shopping bags, or even paper bags, take your own bags with you to the store.

Recycle correctly. First, make sure the item really is recyclable. Recycle Coach, a free, downloadable App. for your smartphone, is a good resource. Not only will it tell you what can be recycled and how, it can also remind you when to put out your curbside recycling bin.

Next, make sure the item is clean, with no food waste or liquid.

Finally, dispose of it properly. Plastic bags and film wrap account for about 20% of the contamination in curbside collection bins. While these items are recyclable, they need to be placed in collection bins at large retail stores.

Learning to recycle properly not only helps the environment, it can also save money.

Foreign Film Night

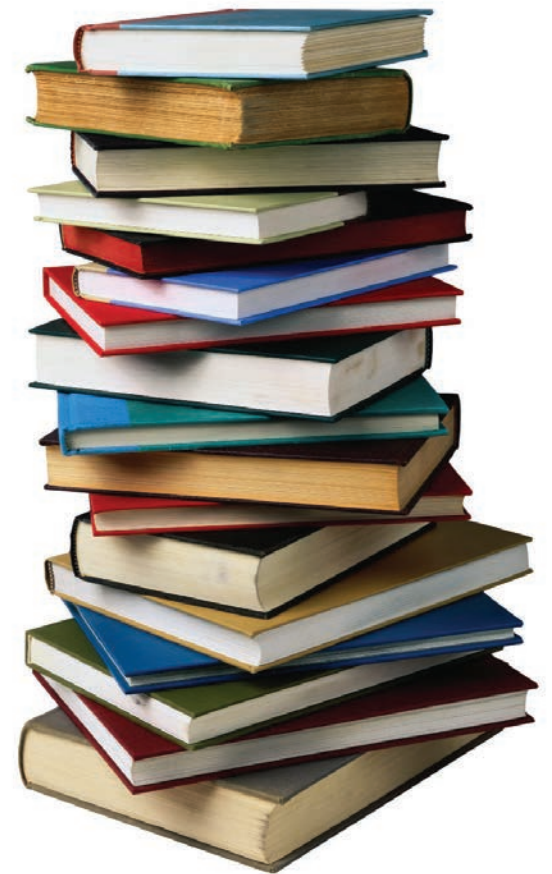
