Note from your Haddon Heights' Tax Assessor

New Jersey Law requires the Tax Assessor's office to keep all property assessments current. The Assessor's inspector may visit your property if the property owner or their contractor obtained a building permit to build a new building, or update, improve, expand, remodel, redecorate, rehab and/or demolish an existing building located in Haddon Heights. Please cooperate with the Assessor's inspector who will perform an interior and exterior examination of your home or business, and request information to confirm the type of work done, or to be done, the cost of the project, and the date the job was, or is to be completed. This inspection is in addition to any inspection(s) required by the Haddon Heights Building Inspection Department. The inspector will visit your property unannounced in the

day, early evening, or on a Saturday. This method of inspection is very cost effective and I greatly appreciate your help allowing the inspector to collect the data required. The inspectors who work for the Tax Assessor's office are Kathleen Moore (Kate), Judith Shoemaker (Judi), Louis Principato (Lou), and myself. Each inspector will wear an official Haddon Heights Borough ID Badge.



2015 Tax Sale

The 2015 tax sale date has been set to October 13th and will be held at Borough Hall. The tax sale will be for any unpaid tax, CCMUA, or other municipal charge from 2014.

The Borough will begin advertising the tax sale and all properties subject to the sale on or around August 14th. The advertisement is placed in the Retrospect, as well as being posted in four public places in town.

Emergency Management C.E.R.T. Team

Audubon and Barrington have invited Haddon Heights' residents to be part of their C.E.R.T. team.



C.E.R.T stands for What is C.E.R.T? Community Response Team - a group of community members who are trained to care for themselves, their families and their neighbors in the event of a disaster. CERT educates the team about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic response skills - fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization and disaster medical operations. Team members use what they have learned in their classroom training and exercises to assist others in their neighborhood or workplace after an event when professional responders are not available. Members are encouraged to support emergency response agencies and take a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their own communities. CERT training

empowers community members to prepare responsibly and respond appropriately when an emergency occurs.

In 1985 the Los Angeles Fire Department realized that in the early stages of a disaster, especially an earthquake, the local emergency responders would be overwhelmed. Basic training in disaster survival skills would improve the ability of the community members to survive until responders and other assistance arrived. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) worked with the Los Angeles Fire Dept. to make the CERT program applicable to all types of hazards and developed a CERT training program to be used nationwide and adapted to meet local conditions when needed.

What does a CERT team do? They provide immediate assistance to victims, support first responders in emergencies, organize spontaneous volunteers at a disaster site, and collect disaster intelligence to support first responder efforts.





Zone Gardening & Watering Chores

About 20 years ago there was a popular health book called The Zone where if I recall, due in part to the book, carbs became the bad guys of the diet world. I read the book and promptly decided after a joyless week without my beloved pasta and bread the program was not for me. But this is not about diets. Here is what I mean about garden zones: There are hardiness zones for plants, which are set by the good folk at the USDA. In creating my online gardening class this past winter I went to the USDA website and saw this cool thing where you can enter your zip code and learn the NEW hardiness zone for your garden. Pretty slick, I think. This doesn't fully address the zone issue, though.

I categorize my gardens and those I design for my clients into WATER zones: A, B, C. "Zone Gardening" is a water-smart way to garden. The "Zone A" is the section of your garden that is closest to the water source, whether this is hose bib, rain barrel, drip irrigation. This is the zone where you want to locate your most needy plants in the water department--annuals and vegetables primarily, container plantings, things with shallow roots that dry out quickly and thus need more hydration. Logic says the plants that need the most water should be closest to the water source; it is a work load issue as well as a best-practice for your plants. Following this are plants that do just fine with the typical water from the sky-- Zone B; and lastly, Zone C is for the plants that can take the Southern NJ heat come August and not blink a pretty petal. And you won't lose sleep over drooping leaves.

It might come as a surprise to you to hear me say that there is one garden chore I dislike more than any other. In fact, it may be the only chore I don't like much at all--dragging a hose.

I will start off to say that the first step with the hose in our garden is to reach behind some lovely shrub where the hose hangs looped on a bracket attached to the fence. Since our garden is water-wise already, I don't use the hose very often (which is why it is located behind a shrub to begin with)



and because of this, without exception, there is a healthy wad of spider web to contend with. I gulp hard and make my move. Then, I have to very carefully and strategically get the hose out into the open of the stone walk. Despite focused attention, I still manage to break stems. Then there are the kinks and the animation. I am convinced that my hose takes fiendish delight in wrapping itself around my ankle at every possible opportunity, gnarling itself to defy the hardest snap I can provide, requiring me to take steps all the way back to set it straight for flow. So much for my prayer for patience. Or perhaps that is the point but just the same by now there are "words" I should not say around young flowers. But the worst part of all is the patch of prickly pear cactus that the hose finds to drag itself through--no matter what. I am convinced that getting within a foot of that plant is like encountering a bunch of medieval soldiers poised with arrows atop a castle wall. The cactus shoots out hair- like thorns that will penetrate a glove, lodge under a sock intent on ruining the most beautiful garden work day. Why do I have this evil plant, you ask? Because the yellow flowers are so beautiful and there are not a lot of yellow flowers I really like. So they stay and I keep a distance. I even pull

weeds among their paddles with TONGS.

Now that I've had my rant, back to the Zones: the point is, take some time to assess what is going on in your garden in terms of these Zones. With spring here (sort of) you might consider transplanting

some things to



put them into the Zone that makes life better for them--and for you. It also might help you make better plant selections, and in the ecological sense as it will help you use less water. If you use a rain barrel, by locating your containers close to it you may find that it collects enough water to keep you from using municipal water at all, which was the case in our garden last summer.

Sustainable Summer Yard Care



Many people long for a lush green lawn, from spring through fall. As the rains of late spring and early summer decrease, it is perfectly normal for lawns to turn brown as the temperature rises since most of our lawns are cool weather grasses. Many homeowners he lawn has died when

think it means that the lawn has died when, in reality, it is simply dormant. Don't fertilize or reseed in an attempt to revitalize the lawn.

Water lawns and garden beds once a week, early in the morning. Provide 1 to 1 ½ inches of water at one time if possible. Frequent watering for short periods of time makes the problem worse since it prevents the lawn from forming deep, healthy roots. Watering mid-day is wasteful since most of the water evaporates. Watering in the evening increases the chance of fungus and other diseases since the lawn and plant foliage stays wet all night. When that happens, homeowners frequently reach for chemicals to fix the problem and put more contaminants in the soil. Invest in an inexpensive rain gauge or simply re-

purpose a clean, standard-size tune can or cat food can which is 1 inch high. Be sure to put the rain gauge



in an open area where no plantings to obstruct collection. Use this as a guide and only water if the weekly total is less than 1 inch.

Don't mow the lawn during a dry spell as it stresses the lawn. Keep the mower at its highest setting. After mowing, the lawn should be 3 inches high. High grass holds more moisture, fights weed growth, and helps develop deeper roots. Do not bag the grass clippings, but leave them on the lawn to provide free fertilizer. It saves time and effort as well as decreases yard waste for the town to collect. Over-watering and over-fertilizing create thatch, not leaving clippings on the lawn. Do not fertilize during the hot, dry summer since it can damage the lawn. Lawn services often do things routinely, so be sure to tell them how you want your lawn cared for when it is hot and dry.



Lawns are not sustainable due to their water and fertilizer needs as well as the pollution caused by mowers and edgers. While we have not suffered the severe droughts affecting other areas of our country, it is likely we will feel its affects at some point in time. Now is the time to change your lawn routine to a more sustainable one. Next year consider decreasing the amount of lawn in your yard by planting drought-resistant ground covers or increasing the size of garden beds with native plantings, which generally are drought-resistant once established.




